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POPULIST ADDRESS.

John Swinton Speaks to Members of His Party in New York.

WHO WILL BE NEXT PRESIDENT?

Alight, Sirs, say, if the election is thrown open, Congress and Populists hold the balance of power.

New York, Oct. 1.—John Swinton addressed 200 members of the People's party last evening. What he said was earnest if not all times complimentary to those whom he addressed, and the indications are, the People's party will have up or may be in their convention today. The book was set in motion before he had been speaking fifteen minutes and had ten times pronounced that by the time he finished three choices were given "for our next mayor." Mr. Swinton shook his head negatively.

The first thing Mr. Swinton said to the New York audience was: "It is not impossible that the next President of the United States may be a Populist." Then he read an extract from a published speech from California, in which he asserted that the leaders of the People's party were so used to the fact that the Democratic and Republican parties were combining against it, "My hope is, it is possible that the selection of the President will be made by the People's party, and that the People's party may hold the balance of power, in view of this contingency, it is well for us to consider our candidate. Who, I think, will be the Populist President in the next election?"

All this question, which was propounded scathingly in sermons, off a dozen men in the audience said, "Pader!"

"Yes, Sir," said Mr. Swinton, "Pader will be the Populist President, unless some other person is chosen, being regarded as a decent person. That is fact. If he would share his preferences board, he might answer, but not otherwise."

"No, Sir," said Mr. Swinton. "His last utterance to you regarding becoming president will not do."

"Holiness," said somebody.

"Holiness" said the orator, "he is not fit to be the master of a country village."

Allen of Nebraska, and Lulu Penne, of Colorado, were next named by the audience.

"He is too young and the other is too old," said Mr. Swinton, diplomatically.

"Wade and Lewellen," cried a voice in the rear of the audience.

"What is Wade?" asked the orator.

"He is not fit to be president."

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"Hooray!" said somebody.

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
