WANTS SARKISIAN SWEATED.

At Marseilles to "Treat" Suspect. •New York, July 6.—A cablegram has been sent to United States consul Skin-ner at Marseilles, France, by Inspector McCafferty of the detective bureau, asking that Paul Sarkislan, who is under arrest there in conection with the murder of Farther Kaspar Vartar-ian, the Armenian priest, be sweated. McCafferty sent the following messags: "Tell Sarkislan he stopped at 161 An-tione street, Montreal with the others. Make him tell all about the murder. Tell him it will be best for him. We know more than he thinks." Inspector McCafferty is positive that Sarkislan ded from New York with booradian and Ermoyan, and he feels that the suspect under arrest in France is lying to save himself. McCafferty souts the theory that Sarkisian fled through fear of having the crime put upon him and the detective chief says that the prisoner had as much to do with the killing of the priest as the two others.

The mob by whom he was attacked gave him 24 hours notice to leave town under penalty of some-thing worse happening, but Newman will disregard the threat and intends to go about his business as usual.
