OLE BULL'S Concerts .- Ole Bull, the reat violinist, arrived, to-day, by the cars from the West. He will appear to-morrow night at his concert in the Theater; and a brief reference to his life will be interesting.

He was born in Bergen, Norway, February 5th, 1810; consequently he was sixty scenes from Nature, years of age on the 5th of last month. He The Habits of Birds and Reptiles, was early designed for the Church, but his passion for music could not be repressed; and when at the University of Christiana, at eighteen years of age, his skill on the vio-lin was somewhat astonishing. When nineteen, he went to Cassel to study, and soon after tried the study of law at Gottnigen; but his love for art drew him from law; and at Minden, where he had given a very successful concert, he was drawn into a duel, which induced him to leave his native land for Paris. | Many other Subjects, Here he was robbed of everything, even his violin; and in a fit of despai; he threw himself in the river Seine, but was rescued, and liberally assisted by a lady to whose dead son he bore a resemblance. He then gave concerts for a number of years in various countries of Europe, winoing fame and amassing a fortupe. In 1834 he first came to the United States, where he created a furore. In 1848 he fought in the French revolution in Paris; and subsequently made a campaign in Algeria, against the Kabyles, with Gen. Yuauf. He made improvements in musical instruments; built a Theatre in his native town of Bergen; and endeavored to establish national schools of literature and art in Norway. In 1852 he bought 120,000 acres of land in Pennsylvania, and founded a Norwegian colony, which was ultimately a failure. To particularize the numerous places or countries in which he has given concerts, would occupy too much space; as he has continued traveling, everywhere maintaining his great reputation as a vio-

Ole Bull is still robust, and is said to re-tain all of his old-time inspiration and skill. He is assisted by minsicians of ac-knowledged talent; and his concerts will be such treats as are rarely enjoyed by lovers of music.

Mr. Watson, his agent, who leaves for the East to-morrow morning, is himself a violinist of such reputation, that he bears the title of "the American Paganim," We need hardly tell everybody to get tickets for to-morrow night.
