LOCAL BRIEFS.

New Singer in Town.—A fine boy arrived at the home of W. C. Lamoreaux, 1360 Fifth East, at 1:30 this morning. All are reported doing well.

Horizontalists to Meet.—The Salt Lake County Horticultural society will hold a meeting in the city and county building at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Cashier Ponchob's Vacation.—Cashier Ponchob of the Merchants' bank of this city has gone to Geneva, on Utah lake, as chaperone for the last boys' camp of the party.

These Will be Eyewitnesses.—Two large cases containing photographs of Salt Lake public schools, and other schools of the state were shipped yesterday afternoon to the Seattle fair.

Hot Time for Surveyors.—The surveyor's camp on the Utah Southern railroad was visited by fire the other day, which destroyed the tent and considerable clothing belonging to members of the party.

"Misfortunes Never Come Singly."—A. L. Brantley is in hard luck. His wife died suddenly in Los Angeles recently, and was buried this week in M. Olivet, and now their two children aged 11 months and 8 years are down with smallpox.

Phone to National, Nev.—The Utah & Nevada Telephone company is now running its lines into National, Nevada, where such marvelous strikes are reported. H. L. Thomas, general manager of the company, reports that one recent strike at that camp, after assessing \$31 to the pound was dug out of the earth.

Mayo, Hill on Deck.—Former Harry Hill of San Francisco and Governor Mayo of this state, who is now staying at the University club where he is meeting many old time friends, is the general manager of the Bell Telephone company here, and was greatly interested in the building up of the University club.

Two Autos Burn.—An automobile standing in the Exchange Automobile company's garage proved to be a real devil-wagon yesterday when it started a fire that resulted in the destruction of two machines, a Pope-Toledo worth \$3,000, and a \$2,000 Cadillac. The fire was caused by two wires on the Cadillac, which were short-circuited, throwing out sparks that ignited the gasoline in the tank of the Cadillac.

Sails For Peru.—Hon. A. W. McCune sailed from New York, July 6, for Lima, Peru, en route to the Cerro de Pasco mining properties. It will be remembered that Mr. McCune was successful recently in raising \$2,000,000 through the New York firm of McCormick Bros., on bonds guaranteed by the Peruvian government, with which to begin building the extension of his railroad down the eastern slope of the Andes mountains to the headwaters of the Amazon river. As soon as Mr. McCune reaches Peru contracts will be let and construction begun on the surveying is all done, and the selection of the two tentative routes prepared will require but a few hours consideration.

UNPRECEDENTED GROWTH OF CITY

As Shown from Water Tax Assessment Rolls Which Have Been Completed.

1,303 HOUSES CONNECTED.

This Number Represents New Domiciles Which Have Tapped the Mains During the Year.

From the water tax assessment rolls, which were completed yesterday, it is shown that the growth of Salt Lake City is unprecedented. In the last year there have been 1,303 houses connected with the water mains.

The square yards of lawn which are sprinkled by Salt Lake amount to 277 acres of ground—a good big farm. Of this total amount 160 acres of lawn are on the east side and 74 acres on the west side.

It is shown from the receipts that the revenues of the water system have increased during the year. The department has received \$50,000 more in revenue than last year.

The revenue for the assessment this year will amount to \$50,000.
