

tion by maintaining the extension of the new Catholic university and college.

Paris, 13.—The Minister of Public Works when before the budget committee, maintained that 60,000,000 francs only are available for public works not completed. Ferard, Minister of Finance continues to affirm there are 153,000,000 francs available.

Berlin, 13.—The German Parliament will be opened on the 30th of November. Leading important measures will be postponed for discussion until after Christmas.

Leaders of the Center party resolved to demand that the privilege of equal rights which have been granted the Old Catholics in common with the Roman Catholics be withdrawn from the former; also, that the Catholic priests be permitted to say mass and administer the Sacrament without the previous sanction of the Prelate.

Berlin, 13.—To-day an explosion occurred in a mine near Oberthor Green, Saxony. Thirty-three persons were badly wounded.

A business meeting of the Society of Berlin Working Men was dissolved to-night by the police, under the Socialist law.

Vienna, 12.—The authorities have taken extensive precautions to suppress any disturbances. Crowds of workmen to-night thronged the scenes of the late riots. Strong parties of cavalry, infantry and police were on guard at Neubau. Leopoldstadt, the Jewish quarter, is reported to be the object of attack, and is specially protected. Arrests continue.

The examination of persons arrested for participation in the late riots shows it was chiefly the work of Socialists and anti-Jewish leaders. Twenty-five thousand bills with anti-Jewish inscriptions were seized by the police, who are preparing a list of the implicated for expulsion from the country. Hawarth, suspected conspirator, at whose house in Little Pesth, the bombs, etc., were found on Saturday, has been released.

Lisbon, 13.—Latest advices from Chili are that peace negotiations are renewed with Peru, it is reported on the basis of the cession of Tacla and Arica.

Rome, 13.—The Radical party today celebrated the anniversary of the battle of Mentana by a visit to the battle field. Caragany made a speech, in which he alluded to the Italian Freedents, when the police interfered and broke up the meeting.

Chevalier Nigra is appointed Ambassador to England.

Madrid, 13.—A telegram from Manila, states that a body of native insurgents of the Zooloo Islands, attacked the Spanish fort but were defeated with 70 killed. Spanish loss, 20 killed and wounded. Order has been restored.

Cairo, 12.—Counsel for the prosecution states the proceedings of the court martial in the case of Arabi Pasha and his followers will last at least two months.

Dr. Schwinfurth publishes a letter in which he states the reconquest of the Soudan is necessary to the existence of Egypt, although it will take many millions in funds to accomplish it, as troops will have to be sent forward by three routes. Ten thousand will be recruited, which will be commanded by Isma'il Pasha Eyoub, with the American General Stone, as chief of staff.

City of Mexico, 12.—A proposition made by Gen. Ord, agent of the Mexican Southern Railway, for the combination of that road with the Mexican Oriental, has been disapproved by President Gonzales. The Government appears disposed to grant subvention to the Oasis branch of the Mexican Southern. Jay Gould will obtain a modification in the Oriental grant made him by agent De Gress, which refers to the forfeiture of the concession and construction of temporary wooden bridges. It is thought that work will be commenced immediately after this modification is secured.

PARIS, 14.—Figaro has a dispatch from Cairo which affirms that the governments of England and France have entered into a definite agreement in regard to the control of the finance of Egypt. It says France has accepted the offer of England that the presidency of the public debt commission be given to France as a compensation for doing away with the present system of control. The other questions relating to the organization of the finances of Egypt will be treated by these two governments in concert with the other great powers of Europe. Of their approval, Gladstone is said to

believe he has already sufficient assurance.

Dublin, 14.—The trial of Patrick Joyce on the charge of being a participant in the massacre of the Joyce family at Moamstrana, was continued before Judge Barry today. Another prisoner accused of the murder has turned up and the case seems likely to be fully made out. The election is proceeding quietly. The Freeman's Journal is out with a leader in which it offers an apology for its recent accusations and harsh language against General Wolseley, and against offering him the freedom of the city. It says Wolseley has written a letter stating it is his earnest desire to see Ireland a loyal, peaceful, prosperous land.

Philbin, the informer, gave evidence against the prisoner. He presented a sullen, dejected appearance, evidently had no sympathy with his own part in the prosecution. His testimony nevertheless confirmed the evidence already published, that ten men went to the Joyces' house. He, prisoner, saw Patrick Joyce enter the door of witness and then ran away, and as he fled heard behind from the house shouts of "Murder" and screams for help.

LONDON, 14.—Captain Ludlow, of the steamer Westphalia, states that the steamer with which his vessel came into collision yesterday, burned blue lights at her masthead for two hours after the collision occurred, and that the crew would have had ample time to escape. He believes they must have floated their boats and is very hopeful all will be heard from in the course of time.

Mecca, 14.—No cholera has appeared here since the 4th of this month.

There is said to be in Wyoming a solid bed of crystallized soda, containing 50,000,000 cubic feet of that very useful article in a chemically pure state.

The wool clip of Oregon for 1882 has been estimated at 10,000,000 pounds, 2,000,000 in excess of that of last year. The quantity, however, is inferior.

Mexico wants no reciprocity treaty with the United States, or with any other power, for the good reason that about all her revenues are derived from importation duties.

Three hundred thousand sheep have been driven through the State of Nevada, this season, to points East, feeding along the way and making fat mutton when arriving at the destination.

New Orleans is to have the honor of being the first city in the Union to erect a monument to a woman. The person to be thus honored is Margaret Houghery, the recently deceased benefactress of the Orphan Asylum of that city.

An eastern exchange says: "The result of the late elections has had the effect of a family funeral on the employes of the various departments at Washington. Work was for the most part abandoned the day after the event, and grave faces, deep sighs and other evidences of grief, were seen on every side."
