

Panama advices state that President Guzman Blanco, of Venezuela, has decreed the expulsion from the republic of Bishop Merida, for opposing the establishment by law, of civil marriages; the bishop died before he could embark. Dr. Baralt was named his successor by the president, but refusing to obey other orders than those of the holy see, he was arrested and sent out of the country, followed by various other priests.

The Argentine republic proposes to the nations on the Pacific to settle the question of the ownership of the straits of Magellan by declaring them neutral.

During the election in Buenos Ayres the defeated party undertook to falsify the registry, the other side retaliating by throwing two Orsini bombs among the former, but they failed to explode.

The Attorney General has directed the U. S. Attorney for the Western District of New York to take an appeal to the Supreme Court in the case of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Co., against U. S. Internal Revenue Collector Bailey.

The Navy Department will not order north, this summer, the vessels now in the Gulf of Mexico and cruising in the waters adjacent to the West Indies, but they will all remain about their present stations, so that in case of necessity for their presence in that latitude, it will not be necessary to fit out and send new vessels thither.

RALEIGH 13.—Governor Caldwell's remains arrived from Hillsboro last night, and lay in state during the day; they will be taken to Morgantown, where he resided, to-morrow, for interment. Delegations of citizens, officials and military, will accompany them. Lieut. Governor Brodgen has assumed the duties of the office of Governor.

FULTON, N. Y., 13.—A boiler in Pashall & Co.'s flouring and saw mill exploded to-day, demolishing the mill and fatally injuring Perry Pashall and son; two others were less seriously injured.

ROCKFORD, 13.—This afternoon's fire was more serious than at first thought, the loss being \$30,000 to \$40,000, with only \$1,000 insurance. During the progress of the fire one fireman was sunstruck and another seriously hurt by falling from a building.

BIG RAPIDS, Mich., 13.—Ten business houses were burned yesterday, with property worth \$25,000.

MONTREAL, 13.—The Orangemen, while returning from church service yesterday, were attacked by twos and threes, their lights and badges torn from them, and otherwise insulted.

SAN FRANCISCO, 13.—Julia Armstrong, a widow living on Geary St., hanged herself to-night; the reason for the suicide is unknown.

W. J. McCormick, collector of customs at San Diego, who told a story of having been robbed of about three thousand dollars in government funds, by two men, was arrested to-day, charged with having embezzled the money; he was released in ten thousand bail.

JAY COOKE & CO.'S CREDITORS.—Philadelphia, July 3.—The creditors of Jay Cooke & Co. will be glad to know that E. M. Lewis, trustee, has received a letter from the President of the Oregon Steam Navigation Company, inclosing a check for a dividend on \$1,500,000 stock held for the estate, amounting to \$37,500 in gold, which was exchanged for currency, and produced over \$41,000. Other dividends will follow as the season progresses, as the property is exceedingly well managed and prosperous. The policy of the Oregon Navigation Company has been uniform for the last twenty years, first to pay every dollar of expenses and indebtedness and then divide out to the stockholders, monthly, all cash surplus.—*Washington Star.*

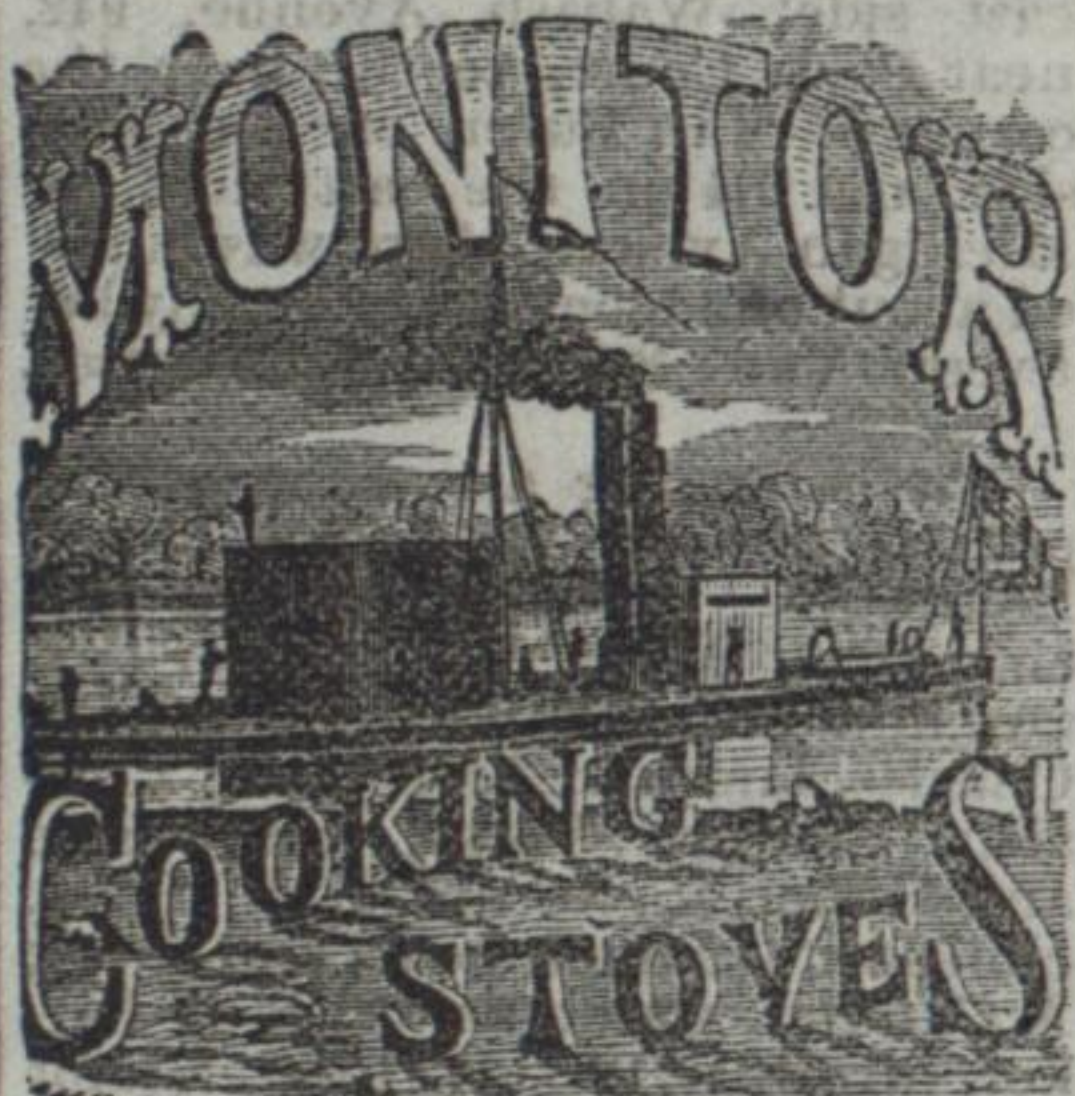

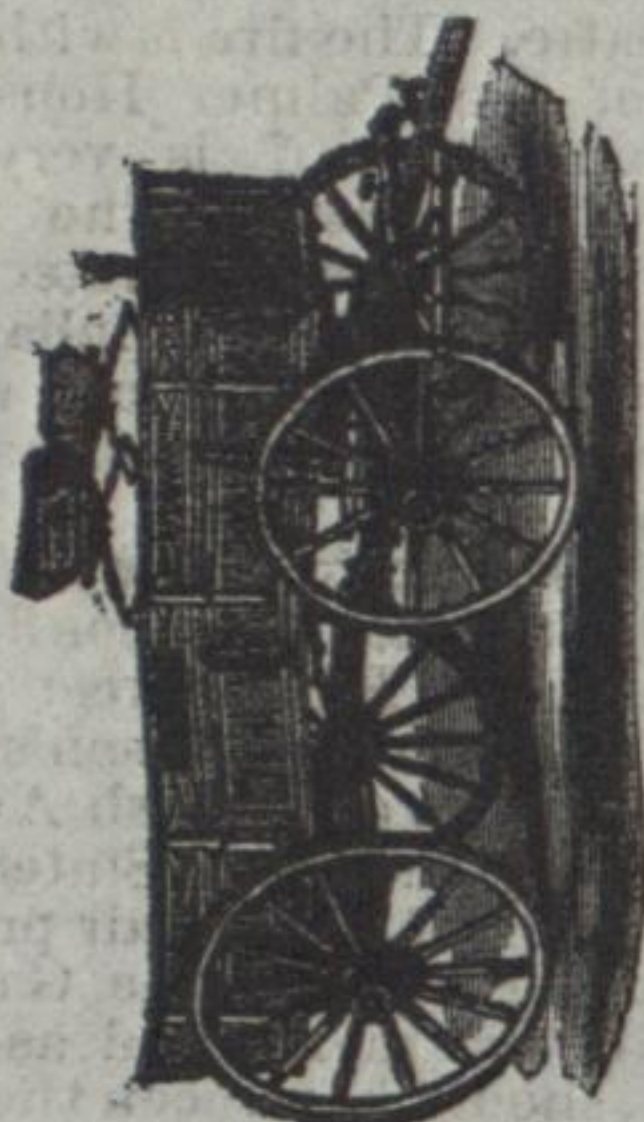
