New York, Jan. 10 .- If President Mc-Kinley had not forbidden it, Gen, Adna R. Chaffee admitted, in an address at the Hamilton club, in Brooklyn, where he was the guest of honor at a dinner a commemoration of the birthday of Alexander Hamilton, he would have seized treasure worth \$80,000,000 when he was in command of the American

troops in China. He knew exactly the location of this treasure in the forbidden city and had planned to take possession of it, he said, when the president vetoed the proposition. It was his intention to old out an amount that might be settled upon as a proper indemnity, and return the remainder to the Chinese

return the government. "We and the Japanese had the hon-or of guarding the gate to the forbid-den city," said Gen.
