INSTRUCTIONS TO EMBASSADORS.

The Greek army paralyzed Turkish reinforcements for the moment.

LONDON, May 23.—The correspondent of the Standard at Constantinople says the peace negotiations continue. It is asserted that the amount of indemnity will be reduced to 8,000,000 Turkish pounds, to be accepted in Turkey as part payment of the indemnity owed her by Turkey.

It is said here that after the suspension of hostilities the Greeks, under pretense of washing their flags, crossed the bridge over the Arta and were attacked by the Turkish commanders who drove them back after heavy fighting for two hours. The Athens correspondent of the Standard says: The government and people are now only anxious for the cessation of the irregular, and they consequently rally upon General Balamas to take as soon as the conditions of peace have been agreed upon. The Greek army is paralyzed and a new danger to Salonika in the dispatch of large Turkish reinforcements to Thessaly.

The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph in Heraklion gives a terrible picture of the execution of the Italian while crawling from Arta to Heraklion. He says: They sold bravely and bravely like water. Around only with their hands and feet, for the time they reached Heraklion they were greeted by the Greek soldiers, thoroughly armed, got in readiness to fight, and the situation became serious. A Greek tried to push a Greekman out with a stone, but he was instantly killed and wounded a Greekman.

Finally the cry was raised, "A Greek has been killed," and the village began to fire their rifles. The firing became general, and the Italian displayed a flag of truce and the combatants were ordered to stand down. It was a great difficulty. Several officers told me they did not expect to reach Heraklion alive, as their rifles would have been used to kill them.
