Judge Johnson Holds Court — Probate and Other Business.

Manti, Sanpete Co., May 15.—Judge Johnson's court convened here yesterday and heard probate and other matters were attended.

Isaac Poulsen of Ephraim, a more youth pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary, and was this morning sentenced to a term at the reform school. James Lund and Albert Noland of Mt. Pleasant, also mere striplings, pleaded guilty to a similar charge, and they were likewise sent to the reform school.

Lawrence Olsen of Mt. Pleasant, who is charged with burglary, pleaded not guilty, he will be tried tomorrow.

State vs Utah vs Jesse Reynolds, a case of arson. Witnesses were examined and the guilty given to the jury this morning. After being out all the time the jury brought in the verdict "guilty as charged," but judgment was deferred on account of a flaw in the complaint. John Kienke, Pioneer and Respected Citizen, Died from Pneumonia.

Nephi, Juab Co., May 14.—The many friends of John Kienke were greatly surprised and pained to hear of his death at his farm a few miles north of this place, at 10 a. m. today. The deceased was taken sick the latter part of last week with the prevailing cold, which turned to pneumonia and resulted fatally as above stated. "Uncle" John Kienke, as he was familiarly called, was one of the early settlers of Nephi, having located here in 1852. He had been severely ill for several months, both scrofulous and civil. He was Bishop of Mena for several years and at the time of his death was a member of the High Council of this Stake. He was also a member of the University land commissioners and a member of the last city council. His sudden death will be a loss to his wife, who has the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.
