A new movement has been made by the Peonians of Nashville, Tenn. The object is to have 500,000 men absolutely pledged before another moon is made.

The large woolen mill of Dow & Boynton, at Hinesburg, Vt., was destroyed by fire lately. Loss over \$40,000, insured for \$14,000, which expired a few minutes before the fire occurred.

The inhabitants of Long Island, on the coast of Maine, have been suffering for food, having been cut off from the main land for two months by ice, and obliged to subsist on muscies and other shell fish. They have now been supplied with better provisions.

An old lady living on eastern island, who is a strong advocate of the female suffrage, says she has paid tax on her dog for ten years, that her patience is getting worn out, and that if she is not allowed to vote pretty soon she is determined to kill the dog!

Illinois papers report a remarkable phenomenon at Scottville. In digging in several localities near that place, a depth of five or six feet, fire breaks out and continues blazing. No wonder the citizens are puzzled and uncomfortable about it.
