The studio of Phidias at Athens, with the three statues which Phidias wrought, bore out in a measure the illusion which cling to one who has seen it in former years, but the awakening came only too soon, and glad enough were we to escape to Broadway where the light and whirl of electric cars made the present a vivid realization of time, place and environment to the discomfort of the past.
