

MARINES TO GUARD THE U. S. EMBASSY

They Go From the Cruiser Minneapolis at Gravesend to St. Petersburg.

STREET FIGHTING AT KIEF.

Intense Alarm in Russian Capital—Population Almost in State of Panic.

Berlin, Dec. 3.—A guard for the United States embassy at St. Petersburg passed through here today. The men, who were dressed in civilian clothes, are believed to be from the cruiser Minneapolis, which is at Gravesend, England.

PROBABLY SERVANTS.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The men referred to as passing through Berlin en route to the American embassy, according to state department officials here, are probably household attendants which Mr. Meyer, American ambassador to Russia, has engaged for his personal service in St. Petersburg. While in Washington recently Mr. Meyer spoke of his intention of securing and taking with him such attendants for the embassy. It is said here that this has probably given rise to the impression that they were members of a special guard for the embassy at St. Petersburg.

Ambassador Meyer is now on his way to St. Petersburg, and his arrival there is expected daily. While neither he nor any other member of the embassy at St. Petersburg has made any request for anything in the nature of a guard for the embassy, state department officials say, yet it is suggested here that the presence of additional household attendants will give a greater degree of security to the members of the staff in the event of any demonstration that might occur.

FIGHTING AT KIEF.

Kief, Russia, Dec. 3, via Warsaw, Dec. 3.—There has been serious street fighting between numerous sappers and Cossacks and between workmen and bands of the "Black Hundreds." Scores of persons have been killed or wounded. Martial law has been proclaimed.

ALARM IN ST. PETERSBURG.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 2, 1 p. m., via Berlin, Dec. 3.—Intense alarm prevails here. Communication with the outside world by telephone ceased this morning, when the Finnish operators joined their Russian comrades.

The embassies, legations and banks are hastily organizing courier services to both the Finnish and German frontiers. The population is almost in a state of panic, fearing that the railroads will stop running, and that the inhabitants, therefore, will have no means of flight in the event of the catastrophe which they seem to fear is imminent. Stories of the spread of the disaffection in the guard regiments are in everybody's mouth, and the revolutionaries continue to boast that the troops will no longer fire on the people.

This morning newspapers were openly hawking fly sheets in the streets, containing an account of an alleged revolt at Tsarskoe-Selo, and crying out, "The emperor's palace guard has mutinied." According to reliable information the only foundation for these stories is the arrest of the soldiers of the guard at Tsarskoe-Selo Thursday. Nevertheless, in their excited state the people give ready credence to all rumors, and this adds to the general alarm.

The air is also filled with stories of the alleged revolution at the palace on Friday, in which Grand Duke Boris is said to have attempted the life of the emperor. These stories likewise are untrue, but they prove that a revolution in the palace is considered possible at any time.

This situation has greatly increased the dangers of a financial crash. The people, even the commercial interests, are withdrawing their money from the banks, converting it into gold, hoarding it, or demanding foreign exchange, which the state bank is issuing upon the foreign balances of the government. Exchange on London yesterday rose to 9.50, over a ruble above the normal.

The Associated Press has just learned from a high authority that the situation in the Baltic region has grown exceedingly grave, and the troops at Revel and neighborhood are in open mutiny. This was the real cause of the extraordinary cabinet meeting which was held at Tsarskoe-Selo last night.

All attempts to secure details of the uprising have thus far failed. According to reports the attitude of the troops in the Baltic provinces is regarded as the most dangerous factor that has thus far developed.

A strike of the policemen and house porters of St. Petersburg is scheduled for tomorrow (Sunday).

Count Witte continues to refuse to deal with the telegraphers, declaring that for the government to yield would be equivalent to its abdication at their order. Nevertheless, the surrender of the government to their demand for the dismissal of M. Durnovo, acting minister of the interior, is regarded as inevitable.

Instructions to the governor and the local authorities are being sent with great difficulty over the railroad telegraph lines.

WALKING DELEGATES WARNED.

St. Petersburg, Saturday evening, Dec. 2, by courier to Rytikhoven, East Prussia, Dec. 3.—There is perceptible a more confident feeling in government circles tonight. It is believed the danger of an immediate general political strike and railroad tie-up is past and that the workmen's council will stand by a compromise and which governmental and private factories will be opened. This will leave the hands of the government free to deal with the telegraphers. Mr. Reissneroff, superintendent of posts and telegraphs, tonight issued a notice to all telegraph and post employees that unless they returned to work tomorrow they would be discharged and their places filled. The prefect of St. Petersburg, Gen. De Delouin, also issued a proclamation warning walking delegates and agitators that any attempt to dissuade employees, either of private or public concerns, by threats of violence to leave factories, military or public institutions would lead to their arrest and the imposition of a term of 2500 and imprisonment for three months.

The government version of the arrest of the soldiers of the guard at Tsarskoe-Selo places it entirely new complexion on the affair. According to this version the soldiers were incited at the mutiny in Sebastopol and at the public insurrection in which they were constantly subjected, even in the streets of Tsarskoe-Selo, and they determined to be led against the revolutionaries and intelligentsia in the capital. When their officers tried to quell them the men became so obstreperous that they had to be arrested.

The reactionary influence at court and the imperial guard are making desperate efforts to unhorse Count Witte, to proclaim a dictatorship and to fight the revolution with bullets and bayonets. Their candidates for dictator are Gen. Count Aleksei Ignatoff and Gen. Skallen, governor general of Poland.

JOHN BARTLETT DEAD.

Compiled Dictionary of Quotations And Concordance to Shakespeare.

Boston, Dec. 3.—John Bartlett, who compiled the work known as "Bartlett's Familiar Quotations," died at his home in Cambridge today, aged 72 years. He was also the author of the "Shakespeare Index" and "Complete Concordance to Shakespeare's Dramatic Works and Poems."

SWINDLES ON EASTERNERS.

Perpetrated on Them by the Land Sharks of the State Of Oregon.

HOLD FORGED CERTIFICATES.

Gov. Chamberlain Unable to Say at Present Time Who the Guilty Parties Are.

Portland Or., Dec. 3.—Only when all persons holding certificates for school land in this state have sent their certificates to Salem to have them examined, will it be possible to make an estimate of the extent of the gigantic swindles perpetrated on easterners by unscrupulous land operators.

Gov. Chamberlain stated to the Associated Press today that there is no limit to the number of forged certificates which could have been made, and it is safe to say, he added, that where the certificates were hypochondriac the full sum or amount shown by the certificates was obtained or where sales were made outright paid by the victim.

Very few of the persons who possess forged certificates are known so far, but from the fact that persons in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, New York, New Jersey, Ohio and Florida are in possession of them, the officials fear that when the whole number develop that it will include people in every state east of the Mississippi river. The heavy losses known to the office so far are H. Goddard of La Crosse, Wis.; George Baldwin of Appleton, Wis.; H. M. Dehnbair of Minneapolis, Minn.

Gov. Chamberlain said tonight that at the present time he was unable to say who the fraudulent operators are. From other officials it was learned that there are certain persons under suspicion, but it is admitted that this suspicion is based on the fact that a man now under conviction in the federal courts of conspiracy to defraud the United States government of part of the public domain, appears as the assignee of the original entryman in one of the forged certificates.

On this piece of property, which lies in southwestern Oregon, the state has

issued two deeds on forged certificates. The original certificate was issued to Grant H. Johnson. One of the forged certificates shows that Johnson assigned the property to H. H. Riggs who re-assigned it to Hiram Goddard. The other certificate purports to have been assigned by Johnson to S. A. D. Pater, who re-assigned it to C. G. Foster and W. H. Richardson.

The certificates which were forged were all for land sold by the state prior to 1900. So perfect were the forgeries it is said when W. H. Odell, former clerk of the land board was shown a forged certificate he asked if it were his signature which was attached he hesitatingly answered that it was.

Only two methods by which holders may determine the authenticity of their certificates without sending them to Salem are offered by the state officials, the first is so far, all the forgeries discovered are on a paper bearing the water mark "Oregon," a brand of paper that has never been sold in Oregon and the other is the forged certificates are printed from zinc etchings made from photographs of the original blank form.

POSTHUMOUS HONORS TO MIN YUNG WHAN.

Seoul, Korea, Dec. 3.—The emperor has directed that the highest posthumous honors be accorded Min Yung Whan, who committed suicide as a protest against the Japanese protectorate. The body will be given a state funeral.

Ex-Premier Chao and several minor officials have committed suicide in consequence of the action of Japan. On Min Yung Whan's body were found letters addressed to the foreign ministers begging them to interfere on behalf of Korea.

Memorialists continue to gather but are not dispersed. Gendarmes and police are everywhere and alert to prevent a further outbreak.

There is some disposition here to entertain the death of Min Yung Whan with the withdrawal of the American legation as the Koreans had looked upon America as the most likely nation to interfere, and when they realized that they had been entertaining false hopes they became keenly disappointed.

The Christian missionaries are greatly concerned over their future work in Korea, fearing that the new condition of affairs may have some influence upon their efforts.

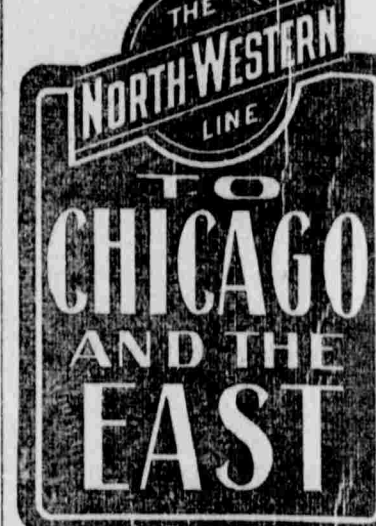

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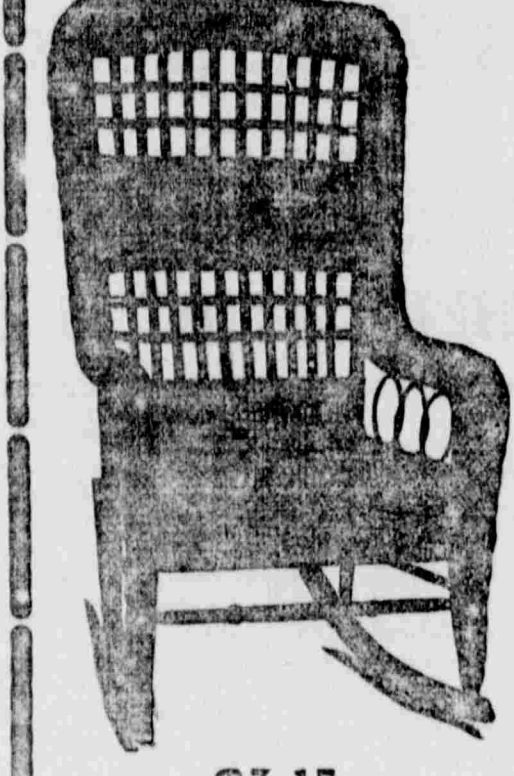
