Democratic Convention Names the Eloquent Silver Orator

AS ITS CHOICE FOR THE PRESIDENCY.

Unanimous Decision Reached Amid Enthusiasm on the Fifth Ballot.

Opposition is made on the part of the states that refuse to vote. The chairman declared the vote on Bryan unanimous as a majority vote was voting for it.
