A CAUTION.—The Stockton, Cal., Independent, of the 19th inst., says;

Lately, W. W. Vaughn bored a well thirty feet in depth on the lot on the southeast corner of Market and San Joaquin streets, and on several occasions has pumped up very remarkable worms. Yesterday one of these hair-like water adders, three inches in length, of a bright red color, with numerous silver-like speckles, was exhibited and underwent a microscopic examination. Many who saw it will be apt, for some time at least, to look closely at water before drinking it. To the naked eye it appeared not much thicker than a horse hair; but a glance through the microscope revealed a worm active and repulsive.

We believe that numerous cases of what are called worms in children, sometimes resulting in death, arise from drinking water contaminated with small worms or other unperceptible vermin, and it would be an excellent plan to have filters to purify all water before drinking it. Any man who would invent an effective cistern for this purpose, that could be easily constructed, and so cheap that it would be within the reach of all, would be a benefactor to his race.
