At Vicksburg fires are becoming so frequent that the insurance companies are cancelling their policies. The city council has passed an ordinance enrolling all able bodied citizens in a body to be known as a special city police.

The tallest man in Cincinnati tops 6 feet 7 inches; the tallest woman 6 feet 2 inches; the heaviest man weighs 420 pounds; the heaviest woman 401 pounds. The shortest man cannot see over a yard stick, while the smallest female is one inch less in height. The oldest man is 97; the oldest woman 92.

In Wisconsin the members of the legislature receive three hundred and fifty dollars each as salary, irrespective of the length of the sessions.

A POINT OF ORDER.—An amusing incident recently occurred in the Virginia convention. Two artists were taking sketches of the assembly while one of the white delegates was speaking. A colored member having discovered the artists, suddenly interrupted the speaker by saying he "rose to a point of order." The Chairman asked him to state his point of order, when he said: "Am dis a convention, or am it a photograph gallery?" He was informed it was a convention. The speaker proceeded.

CENTRAL PACIFIC.—We gather the following interesting items relative to the Pacific railroad from Commissioner Frank Denver, who has just returned from a business tour of inspection of construction, etc. Work has been commenced at Cisco to make the track passable to the summit. On this portion of the route the snow is of an average depth of ten feet, and five heavy locomotives and a large snow plow are rapidly laying bare the rails. As soon as may be, the gap between the summit and Coburn's Station will be built, but no laborers now east of that point will be permitted to go back.

Two fine locomotives have been sent across the Sierra by horse power, and are now being put together for use upon the Truckee river and eastern portion of the road, until the gap at Coburn's makes an unbroken rail to Sacramento, which will be about the 30th of June. What then? Why, only that the building of the road from Sacramento to Stockton has been let by contract, and the labor is being rapidly accomplished, and will be completed this summer.—What then? The rails from San Jose to Stockton will be laid, and the road be in running condition this summer, and thus a continuous line of railroad will be established extending east to such point in Nevada as the most active work and energetic engineering can possibly force it. It has been promised that in 1888 at least 400 miles of road will be completed, and made passable for trains. And then? Why, from Humboldt county to San Francisco will be a continuous line of rail, traversable by locomotives, and making Salt Lake and the Pacific metropolis but 80 hours apart. Meantime, the road from Cheyenne is reaching west with rapid strides, and next October will penetrate the rising ground of the Black Hills, all in running order. Then, progressive people, it will be but about six days railroading and four days staging to New York; and everybody who chooses can visit the old folks at home. The picture is not overdrawn, and the completion of a Pacific road, from New York to San Francisco, is only a matter of time—to be counted before January 1871—which the pluck of the managers is reducing most rapidly. As a matter of interest to the people of Nevada, we can state that cars will be running as far east as Hunter's Station, on the Truckee, in four weeks from this date, unless some unusual freak of nature occurs. There is now at work on the road, this side the State line, over 6,000 men, and 40 miles of rail have just been hauled across the mountains. It is an immense work being successfully accomplished.—[*Virginia Tresspass.*]
