EASTERN.

The Cuban Question—Complications with Cuba.

WASHINGTON, 13.—Arrangements are making for a public meeting here to give expression to the popular sentiment in regard to late events in Cuba.

In reply to the dispatch of the Secretary of State to Consul-general Hall, at Havana, to inquire into the report of the wholesale executions of prisoners, and to enter a protest against the haste of the trial in the face of orders from the Madrid government, Consul Hall says that the Viceroy had already protested against the proceedings, but that his action was seriously obstructed by the Spanish officials, all of whom were in communication before closing against him.

The telegraph line between Santiago and Havana being interrupted, he was prevented from telegraphing to Kingston and other major inquiries in relation to the "Yugoslav" who had brought into port, and there was nothing left to him but the slow process of mails, and this mode of communication was of no avail under the circumstances.

Immediately on receiving the Consul-general Hall's dispatch, the Secretary of State instructed minister Siskles to enter with the Spanish government the protest presented in the proceedings at Santiago, characterizing them as an outrage on civilization and humanity, and an insult to the American government. General Siskles has reported, that he had an interview with the minister of foreign affairs, and acted in accordance with his instructions; and further, that the Spanish government is duly impressed with the responsibility of the conduct presented by those who thought the cash subscriptions were not heavy enough. One Cuban presented his horse and carriage.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.—Sugared.—London, 13.—At a public meeting here, to-night, at which Edward Mailly was chairman, Carolus, a Frenchman, who had been sent from America, gave an account of his visit. He praised the voluntary religious system, and especially commended the public schools of the U. S.

MONTEGO BAY.—The President being released by the constitution and laws from making war on Spain by attacking her colonies, all that can now be done is in the way of naval operations against the Madrid government. The official papers are to be laid before Congress as soon as may be necessary for the purpose of securing the vindication of its honor and the full protection of its citizens. The government, however, in the meantime, will take the proper actions to meet all the issues which may arise, even if they should require force, and this is apparent in the present naval events. The *Kanawha*, *Concord*, or *Ironclad* will be sent to Santiago de Cuba, and will be commanded by Commander A. V. Reed. In addition to this vessel and the *Mahopac*, *Montgomery*, the *Franklin*, *Poughkeepsie*, and *Ossipee* will also be ordered to active service in the North Atlantic squadron. The war department will strengthen the forts in the Gulf, having already taken measures for strengthening and additionally garrisoning Fort Jefferson, Florida. It is the general opinion here that Congress, acting on the recommendations of the President, will promptly take action on the questions to be presented concerning our affairs with Cuba.

Two Deaths.

MEMPHIS, 13.—There were two yellow fever deaths today, both cases reported. No new cases are reported. The air is cool and bracing and the streets lively.

Fever Recommended.

PRINCETON, N. J., 13.—The Princeton Savings Bank made a statement of its condition, showing that its assets are largely in excess of its liabilities, and it proposes to pay off indebtedness in full installments of twenty per cent.

Hiring Teachers—Tweed Case.—500 men set to work—Cuban Independence—Emancipation—Turning—Preparing for Sea.

New York, 13.—The general missionary committee of the Methodist Episcopal church resumed their meeting this morning, Bishop Ames presiding. The committee on the East Indian mission recommended an appropriation of \$32,944 for that object, which was adopted. The sum of \$36,342 was set aside for the West Indian mission, and other sums amounting in the aggregate to \$78,356, were appropriated for the cause of missions in the East Indies.

The Brooklyn board of public works put five hundred men to work to-day.

A meeting of influential Americans sympathetic in the cause of Cuban independence was held at the Astor House this afternoon. A committee was appointed to arrange for a grand mass meeting at the Astor House.

The officers of the German steamer *King William*, which sailed yesterday, and the *Cambria*, which sailed to-day, received a large number of applications from men who had come out by them, and who had been unable to procure employment, to work their passage home, some of them offering all the money they had, and their passage fare. Such a thing has never occurred before, and the officers have taken as many as possible, though they have been able to employ only a very few of the numerous applicants.

Some of the officers at the Brooklyn navy yard profess ignorance with regard to the receipt of orders from Washington, but at the same time say that what could be obtained was at work on the steamers *Pennsylvania*, *Kansas*, and *Jamestown*. The *Kansas* received a supply of stores this afternoon, and it is thought she will sail to-night. The *Jamestown* will be ready to sail tomorrow night.
