SENATOR SMOOT'S CHANCES.

"How about the case of Senator Smoot-do you regard his chances for a fair trial and a just decision as favorable?" was suggested. "Well, yes. I am personally ac-quainted with most of the members of

the senate, and I believe that for the most part the senators will judge the case on its merits and according to law. They are not men who will be swayed by hearsay evidence, or who will yield to an adverse public opinion, if the law
