

DOREMUS SHOULD GET THE SALARY.

Opinion of Attorney General Concerning Pay of State Engineer.

TANNER LAID CLAIM TO IT.

Period in Dispute Covers Week Following Appointment of Mr. Tanner.

The following opinion was rendered yesterday afternoon by Attorney General Breeden in the matter of whether a state officer is entitled to the salary and emoluments of office until he assumed the duties thereof:

Salt Lake City, April 7, 1935.

Hon. J. A. Edwards, State Auditor, City:

Dear Sir—I acknowledge the receipt of your favor of April 6th inst. in which you submit for my official opinion the following proposition:

"Caleb Tanner was appointed by the governor and confirmed by the state senate as state engineer, his bond being approved by the state board of examiners on March 14, 1935, and filed with the secretary of state on the same day. At the request of Mr. Tanner, his predecessor, Mr. Doremus, remained in charge of the office and performed all the duties thereof up to and including March 20."

From these facts you seek to be instructed as to which of these parties is entitled to the compensation attaching to the office, from the 14th day of March, the date of the qualification of Mr. Tanner, and the 21st of March, the day he assumed the duties of the office.

You are advised that before a person can legally claim and receive the salary and emoluments of an office he must first have been duly elected or appointed to such office, and then he must have taken the required oath and filed his official bond, and then he must have assumed the duties of the office and entered upon the discharge thereof.

In the case under discussion it appears that Mr. Tanner was duly appointed and confirmed, and took the oath of office and filed his bond on March 14, but did not assume the duties of the office until the morning of March 21. It also appears that Mr. Doremus had full charge of the office and performed all the duties thereof up to and including March 20. You are therefore advised that it is my opinion that Mr. Tanner is not entitled to the salary and emoluments of his office until he assumed charge thereof and entered upon the discharge of his duties. Mr. Doremus, at the request of Mr. Tanner, having remained in the office and in the discharge of the duties thereof up to and including the 20th of March, is entitled to the salary and emoluments appertaining to said office. Without further elaboration you are instructed that the foregoing is the opinion of this office respecting the matter herein discussed.

SUED FOR DAMAGES.

Rio Grande Western Made Defendant in Action for \$5,110.

George L. Stewart filed suit in the district court today against the Rio Grande Western Railway company to recover \$5,110 as damages for personal injuries, alleged to have been received by him while employed in defendant's

boiler shop on March 15, 1935. The complaint alleges that plaintiff was working on a scaffold attached on the side of a boiler and that, owing to the negligence of defendant, the said scaffold was insecurely fastened and consequently slipped, throwing plaintiff violently against the boiler, wrenching his body and rupturing him. He was compelled to pay out \$110 for medical attendance and he asks judgment for that amount and also for \$5,000 as damages.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.

Joseph A. Bush is Accused of Deserting His Wife.

Suit for divorce has been filed in the district court by Adele M. Bush against Joseph A. Bush on the ground of non-support. They were married at Central Falls, Rhode Island, in January, 1937, and have three sons, of whom plaintiff asks the custody. She alleges in her complaint that defendant is earning \$150 per month and has property valued at about \$20,000. She asks for permanent alimony and the division of the property.

CRUELTY AND DRUNKENNESS.

Mrs. Belle Sims Now Seeks Divorce on Those Grounds.

Suit for divorce was filed in the district court today by Belle Sims against R. T. Sims on the grounds of cruelty and habitual drunkenness. They were married at Mount Pleasant on April 13, 1937, and it is alleged that defendant has for some time past used cross and cruel language towards plaintiff, and has also been guilty of habitual drunkenness. Plaintiff asks that she be awarded the household goods belonging to them and that she be allowed to resume her maiden name, Belle Ivey, 31222.
