

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—The "Naiad Queen" was repeated last night to a good house, and the audience enjoyed its presentation very much. It is the most beautiful spectacle yet produced here. The last scene particularly is one of exceeding splendor, a triumph for the scenic artists, Messrs Methua and Lambourne. The "March of the Naiads" is a most spirited affair, and drew forth rapturous applause from the large audience who witnessed it. The dancing of Madame Scheller, and the singing of Miss Adams created a pleasure and surprise. Madame Scheller dressed and acted the Queen splendidly. She sang the "Beautiful Tale of the Sea" with charming expression. The duet between her and Rupert (Mr. Hardie) was also well rendered. Amphibio (Mr. Graham) and Schnapps (Mr. Margotta) had all their own way for a long time and created great merriment by their funny capers, and eccentricities. The corps de ballet with Miss Clive (Fluvia) as solo-dancer executed their evolutions with precision. Miss Adams makes a pretty Ilex and Mr. Hardie an imposing knight of the Middle Ages. The plot is not very intricate or extensive. Rupert is a noble knight and not being satisfied with his earthly possessions dives to the bottom of the Rhine and falls into the amorous clutches of an immortal, "the Naiad Queen." Schnapps, his brave squire, tumbles after him and falls into the arms of a mermaid, Ilex. After a while having enjoyed themselves hugely in the caverns of the mighty Rhine, they grow tired of their watery brides and sigh for golden wine-lands above. Amphibio, who is a kind of submarine stevedore, brings them to the land again. There, old wickedness of man, the passionate water-nymphs are forgotten, and a Sir Rupert falls in love with Lady Una (Miss Platt) and Schnapps with Mistress Bridget (Mrs. Clawson). Of course the Naiads, by the aid of their submarine cable know everything that is passing above; the Queen and Ilex and all the nymphs swear revenge, arm themselves, come out in gorgeous array and drill like veterans. The demons also come in and join the Naiads, forming most picturesque groupings and effective tableaux. The Naiad Queen finally seeing that Rupert seems to prefer Rhine-wine to water, forgives her truant lover and makes up everything lovely. The transformation scene with its countless shades of color, is a most beautiful scene.

Professor Careless arranged the music for the piece in a remarkably short time, and his pleasing, characteristic and in every respect appropriate.

On Monday evening Madame Scheller will take her Farewell Benefit previous to her departure for Denver, where she will play quite a lengthy engagement under Mr. John S. Langrishe's able management. She has selected for the occasion Boucicault's popular drama, illustrative of southern life, entitled "The Octoroon," which will be produced with a strong cast and new scenery. The drama will in every respect be given in a superior manner. A large steamboat is being constructed by Mr. Reid, and Messrs. Methua and Lambourne, will give us a fine picture of a Southern cotton plantation in the new scenery.

THE CALIFORNIA THEATRE.—The Alta of the 19th has a lengthy description of the opening of Messrs. Barrett & McCullough's new theatre, in San Francisco, a notice of which we published lately with the names of the company. On the first rising of the curtain, Mr. Barrett delivered a poetic address, written for the occasion by Frank Hart, poet and eloquent, being greeted with the warmest applause. The comedy of "Money" followed, which was mounted in most elegant style and capably played. Messrs. Barrett & McCullough were called out, and each had to gratify the audience with a speech, congratulatory dispatches were received from a number of theatres in the principal eastern cities. The scenery, act drop and appointments are spoken of in the highest terms. There were 2,479 persons present in the theatre, bringing \$2,185 in coin to the treasury; and so excellent are the arrangements for egress that the parquette was cleared in two minutes and a half, and the lights were out in three minutes and a half from the close of the entertainment.

LEGISLATIVE.

Friday, Jan. 29th.

HOUSE.—House met at ten a.m.

A message was received from the Council announcing their passage of the House bill appropriating five thousand dollars to be expended as premiums on improved breeds of sheep, with amendments, in which the House concurred.

Mr. Maughan, chairman of special committee, to whom was referred the bill for an act pertaining to damage done by animals, reported back a substitute bill which was ordered printed.

Mr. Taylor presented Memorial of the Assembly to Congress, endorsing the petition of Mr. Hanks and others for a grant of land on which they had established iron works.

The committee on Judiciary reported back "An act to amend an act entitled an act prescribing the manner of assessing and collecting Territorial and county taxes," in which the House concurred.

The committee on Judiciary reported adversely on the bill defining the duties of Territorial, County and Municipal officers having the management and expenditure of public funds.

Mr. Farr presented financial report of Weber county by Walter Thompson, Esq., county clerk.

Leave was granted the Superintendent of the Salt Lake City and Wanship wagon road to introduce a substitute report.

Acting Governor Higgins notified the House of his approval of the act amending section ten of an act defining the boundaries of counties and locating county seats.

Mr. Lyman presented communication of J. S. Gyles in relation to parts of the criminal code; read and referred to committee on Judiciary.

The committee on Revenue were instructed to make enquiry why several of the county Courts had failed to make their financial report as provided by law.

The bill amending the Grantsville city charter was reported back and passed.

Adjourned till tomorrow at ten a.m.

HOUSE.—House met at ten a.m.

A message was received from the Council with accompanying communication from Hon. E. D. Hoge, Associate Justice. Said communication was read and referred to the committee on Judiciary.

The Council announced, by note, their passage of "An act to provide for Mechanic's and Laborers' Lien." Said bill was read and referred to the committee on Judiciary.

A message was received and read from the Council announcing the passage of "An act providing for interest of money," which was read and referred.

Adjourned till Monday at ten a.m.
