Later on, when Dictator Blanco turned a dilapidated old church into a splendid mausoleum for the burial of Venezuela's distinguished dead, the Venezuela's distinguished dead, the mortal part of Bolivar was a third time resurrected and finally deposited above ground, in a beautiful saccophagus, it, the 'Parntheon Nacoimal.' This South American Westminster Abbey is near the northern end of Caracas and the cenotaph of Bolivar occupies what used to be the high alter in the Romish to be the high alter in the Romish service. On top of it is a beautiful life-size statue of the hero, standing size statue of the hero, standing wrapped in a military cloak, surrounded by emblamatic figures-one repre senting "Plenty" scattering corn from a tray, another "Justice" with bandage, sword and scales. The fr with he of the monument is covered will wreaths of artificial flowers, and a wreaths of artificial howers, and an around the walls are set with marble tablets on which are engraved selec-tions from the sayings and writings of the Liberator, sandwiched among the names and coat-of-arms of other Hus-trious Venezuelans. Above the cenotaph is a magnificent chandelier hold-ing hundreds of candles, and on either side are huge candelabra. Back of these stand large cases filed with books, periodicals and manuscripts in all lan-guages, referring to the life and career of Bollvar.
