## YERKES, THE LATE RAILROAD MAGNATE AND HIS WIDOW.



It was learned yesterday that in the hope of prolonging the life of Charles T. Yerkes, Dr. H. P. Loomis, Mr. Yerkes' physician, by a word of professional advice to his dying client's lawyer, Adrian H. Joline, prevented the signing of a new will or codicil, and this would radically have upset the present disposition of the Yerkes estate. In the unsigned will, it is reported that Miss Emille Grigely, sister of Braxton Grigasy, former private secretary of Mr. Yerkes, both of whom had been the railroad man's proteges from childhood, would have been provided for in the will. She had shown the deepest affection for and interest in the dying man, and Mr. Yerkes was continually calling for her. Yerkes left \$16,000,000 for the establishment of a hospital to bear his name and to be built in the Bronx. Provision was also made for the maintenance of the Yerkes art galleries, opposite the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Mrs. Yerkes gets one-half of the income from the deceased's estate, and the son and daughter each one-quarter.
