FOREIGN.

LONDON, 27.—The *Times* Belgrade dispatch says: There is much reason to fear that Prince Milan and his ministers are no longer their own masters in the question of peace or war. If the war is continued, and everything points in that direction, it will be a Russian war in Serbia, until it becomes something more.

LONDON, 28.

The sentinels at Chatham prison have been strengthened to prevent any surprise. The Fenian convicts are carefully watched and are not allowed to mix with the other prisoners. Their actual place of confinement is known only to a few wardens.

PARIS, 28.

It is stated that Don Carlos has informed the French Government that he would not re-enter Spain at the cost of another civil war, and will quit Paris for Belgium or Switzerland in a few weeks.

VIGO, 28.—The departure of the U. S. frigate *Franklin* was delayed on account of the death of a sailor, injured in the recent gale. The *Franklin* sailed at noon to-day with Tread on board. Hunt, with Sands, sailed to-day for Southampton.

VIENNA, 29.

It is reported that Montenegro has sent a reply, identical with Serbia, refusing the renewal of the suspension of hostilities.

Count Andrassy has notified the Servian government that the Austrian consul will quit Belgrade if Prince Milan accepts the royal title.

Count Andrassy has demanded from the Servian agent, a written statement positively declaring Prince Milan's refusal to adopt the royal title.

Gen. Sumarokoff has been instructed by the Czar to obtain a similar and distinct renunciation from Prince Milan at Belgrade.

PARIS, 29.—The publisher of the *Tribune*, a radical newspaper, has been sentenced to three months' imprisonment for publishing an article insulting religion.

LONDON, 29.—A dispatch from Nish, dated yesterday, says: Since four o'clock this morning there has been a continuous and heavy cannonade in the direction of Alexandria.

The admiralty have a letter from Allan Young, commander of the steamer *Pandora*, making a voyage to Smith's Sound to bring to England dispatches deposited there by the Arctic expedition, under Capt. Nares, announcing his arrival at Uppernavik on the 18th of July. He reports all well on board, and says he will proceed northward July 19th. The winds during the summer had been from southward, and were, therefore, not calculated to clear the ice from Melville Bay, but as far as visible from Uppernavik the sea was clear. There was no news of the Arctic expedition.

The Anglo-American *Times* says the man who, at the time of Tweed's departure from Vigo was stopping at the hotel there, under the name of Sands, turns out to be Wm. M. Tweed, Jr.

Sir Thomas White, member of the Board of Aldermen for the ward of Portsoken, was to-day elected Lord Mayor of London. According to general custom, Alderman Thomas Owen, of Bishopsgate, should have been chosen, but the bad state of his health precluded him from taking the office.

The *Pall Mall Gazette* says that a private telegram, received in London, states that Mr. Waite, British minister to China, and the Chinese grand secretary have signed a protocol, and the Yunnan affair is closed.

COPENHAGEN, 29.—It is officially announced that the return of King George to Greece has been indefinitely postponed. The announcement causes great sensation. It is rumored that the King has demanded the cession of Crete to Greece, and the ratification of the frontier in Epirus and Thessaly.
