BILL TO CREATE GLACIER NATIONAL PARK

Washington, Feb. 9.—The house committee on public lands has authorized a favorable report on a bill creating Glacier National Park in northwest Mentana. The bill provides for the setting aside of 1.509 square miles of mountanious country, some of it ten thousand feet above the sea, containing 250 lakes and 60 glaciers. In these regions, Senator Boise Penrose and his brother, Dr. Charles Penrose, had a thrilling bear fight a year ago, and as an additional attraction, it is contended that it contains the only glaciers in the United States outside of Alaska. The claim is disputed, however, on behalf of Colorado.

To Speaker Stanton the president sent

"I trust there will be no misunder-standing of the federal government's attitude. We are zealously endeavor-ing to guard the interest of California and of the entire west in accordance with the desires of our western people. By friendly agreement with Japan we are now carrying out a collective which e now carrying out a policy which tile meeting the interests and desire the Pacific slope, is yet compatible of merely with mutual self-respect ut with mutual esteem and admiration etween the Americans and Japanese.

JAPAN ON THE SQUARE.

The Japanese government is loyally and in good faith doing its part to carry out this policy, precisely as the American government is doing. The policy aims at mutuality in obligation and behavior.

"In accordance with it the purpose is that the Japanese shall come here exactly as Americans go to Japan, which is, in effect, that travelers, students, persons engaged in international business, men who sojourn for pleasure or study, and the like, shall have the freest access from one country to amother, and shall be sure of the best treatment, but that there shall be no settlement in mass by the people of either country in the other.

"During the last six months under this policy, more Japanese have left the country than have come in and the total number in the United States has diminished by over 2,000. These figures diminished by over 2,000. These figures are absolutely accurate and need not be impeached. In other words, if the present policy is consistently followed and works as well in the future as it is now working, all difficulties and causer for friction will disappear, while a the same time each nation will retain its self respect and the good will of the other. "On this point I refer you to the numerous decisions of the United States supreme court in regard to state laws which violate treaty obligations of the United States. 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
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
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
