The News of late has published
in the News a letter from a
subject of the name. I have a few
items to communicate respecting
the subject of the letter.

Some of our cultivators in this

territory have been disposed to

compare by experiment different

kinds of tubers to satisfy them-

selves which are the best for

quality and prolificness, a sure

proof of progress. The Neshan-

nos is capable of doing more, as

will be seen from the following

facts. In the annual report of the

Department of Agriculture pub-

lished in 1874, page 298, is the fol-

lowing statement: "The Neshan-

nos is a variety of the potato, origi-

nally from the Rocky Moun-

tains. Mrs. Elisha P. Hodge, Col-

orado, writes to the Department un-

der date of Nov. 18, 1873, saying

that from one acre seeded with Breese's

Potatoes she obtained 500 bushels of

potatoes, from an acre of Neshan-

nos 600 bushels."

In this experiment the "Peer-

less" was used as a standard, and

the result was that the Neshan-

nos yielded 25 per cent more than

the Peerless. In the Deseret News of

Nov. 3, is a letter from Logan, Cache

County, concerning the Peerless, in

which it is stated that the Peerless

yielded 125 lbs. and the Compton

yielded 150 lbs. and the Compton
