

MEXICO WANTS THEM PUNISHED

Will Ask United States to Deal Severely With Local Authorities of Del Rio, Texas.

FAILED TO DO THEIR DUTY

So it is Charged in Permitting Las Vacas Raiders to Ride on the Texas Side of the River.

City of Mexico, July 2.—Mexico will ask the United States to punish severely the local authorities of Del Rio, Texas, and possibly others of the state under whose authority they acted. The grounds will be that the officers knowingly failed in their duty by allowing persons who participated in the Las Vacas raid to ride on the Texas side of the river, uninterrupted and to bring with them their wounded. Punishment may also be asked for the authorities and police of Del Rio for allowing meetings to be held there for the purpose of fomenting and planning raids, murder and robbery in Mexico.

The latter request, however, will be contingent upon investigations not yet completed which have for their purpose the ascertaining of the amount of knowledge which the police of Del Rio had of the meetings. This new phase of the international side of the trouble on the northern Mexico border was made known today by Minister Mariscal of the foreign relations department. Bad faith toward Mexico by the states of Texas in the recent trouble is very strongly suspected by the Mexican government.

The action of Washington has been the very best, said Minister Mariscal today. "Not only has the United States government shown itself willing and eager to assist Mexico, but took steps to move troops to the border, extending a feeling of friendliness which cannot be questioned by Mexico.

"The sincerity of Texas," he declared, "appears to be another matter. Our doubts in regard to Texas have begun to increase with developments. The failure of local authorities to arrest these men on the ground that their offense was political in my mind has no tenable excuse. No absolute decision has been reached as to whether complaints will be made because the facts in the case have not thoroughly panned out, and there are other important matters for attention, but I am strongly inclined to believe that complaints will be made and punishment asked for."

The minister called attention to the fact that about 100 men held a series of meetings with Del Rio authorities could hardly have taken place in secrecy. A large number of raiders also returned to Del Rio after the trouble and carried with them wounded men, an act that could hardly have been performed in secret.

Mexico will probably ask for the extradition of a portion of the raiders. In this regard Minister Mariscal stated that the Mexican government will wait until the American government has dealt with those offenders whose delinquencies come under the head of the infraction of the neutrality laws. He will now ask for those whose acts were wholly criminal and who should be punished here.

All the acts performed by the raiders of Las Vacas and of Peñasco, and those which are defined in the extradition treaty between the two countries," declared Minister Mariscal.

"Every claim for a political coloring to their work of robbery, murder and destruction of private and government property was contrary to reason and fact. They had no plan and no other purpose other than to appease the grievance of a few discontents who inveigled these poor, simple people into becoming their tools."

The minister stated that the trouble is now entirely over.

REVOLUTIONISTS CAPTURED. San Antonio, Tex., July 2.—Seven armed Mexican revolutionists have been captured by U. S. troops at Del Rio and the surrounding country, according to W. E. Weatherbee, a prominent ranch owner. The revolutionists were captured night before last by detachments of troops, said Mr. Weatherbee. They all have been placed in the county jail at Del Rio. There are about 200 soldiers now at Del Rio and along the river. One hundred men went over to Mexico from Del Rio but not half the number have returned and it is thought that they may have been murdered, or are being pursued by the Mexican soldiers.

POISONED ALE FOR DR. WILSON

Was Delivered to His Residence From Office of the Philadelphia Local Express Company.

WILSON'S NAME FREEHOFF

Description of Man from Whom Package Received Tallies With That of Man Suspected.

Philadelphia, July 2.—The first definite information regarding the movements of the person supposed to have been responsible for the poisoning of Dr. William H. Wilson here last Friday was made public tonight when it was stated that the bottle of ale containing poison which Wilson drank was delivered to his residence from the office of the Philadelphia local express company. The package was received at the express office by Fred Buckman, who describes the man who brought the package there as about 35 years old, smooth shaven, dark complexion and well dressed. The package was large enough to have contained a pint bottle. It was apparently a bottle enclosed in a regular pasteboard carton. On the side was Dr. Wilson's name and address. The man paid in advance for the delivery of the package.

Buckman says that his recollection is that when the delivery man returned from his trip he turned in a receipt for the package signed "Mrs. Wilson." Upon the further investigation of antecedents of Dr. Wilson, Detective Paul received information today that Dr. Wilson's real name was Freehoff, and that he went on the stage for a time and adopted the name of William H. Wilson. He was married about 20 years ago and was the father of four children.

About 10 or 12 years ago he separated from his first wife, who died about two years after. Shortly after having separated from his first wife he married the present widow by whom he had one child.

It is asserted that the description of the man who left the poisonous bottle of ale at the express office to be delivered at the Wilson home tallies with that of the man suspected in the case from the first, and it is for him that the authorities are hunting.

OREGON DELEGATION LEAVES FOR DENVER. Portland, Or., July 2.—Oregon's eight delegates to the national Democratic convention left here tonight for Denver in a special car. They will arrive Saturday.

Chamberlain did not leave here with the delegation and will attend the convention only as a spectator as he passes through Denver en route to the Elks convention at Dallas, Tex., next week.

UNSTABLE OVER COMMITS SUICIDE

Loved Three Women But Was Unable to Decide Which One to Marry.

KILLED HIMSELF FOR EACH

Took Morphine for Carrie; Swallowed Laudanum for Eva; Blew His Head Off for Henrietta.

Chicago, July 3.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Hazelhurst, Miss., says: "Unable to decide which of three women he really wanted to marry, Eli Hood, 17 years old, a boarder at the farmhouse of Eli Graves, eight miles from Hazelhurst, yesterday decided that the best way out of this difficulty was to commit suicide in such a way that each of the women would know that he had killed himself for her. For Miss Carrie Nelson, 18 years old, he swallowed 60 grains of morphine; for Mrs. Eva Spelman, aged 35, he drank four ounces of laudanum; and for Miss Henrietta McDonald, aged 16, he put the muzzle of the shotgun in his mouth and pulled the trigger with his toe.

Beside his body was found on a table a paper wrapper that contained the morphine. On it was scrawled: "For Carrie." The empty laudanum bottle stood on a slip of paper on which was written: "For Eva." An empty envelope, on which a picture of a shotgun had been drawn, was inscribed: "Henrietta." Except that he had been acting queerly and that he had become despondent, Graves said he saw nothing in Hood's behavior that indicated that he contemplated self-destruction.

ENTHUSIASTIC WELCOME GIVEN REP. SHERMAN. Utica, N. Y., July 2.—The home-coming tonight of Congressman James S. Sherman was made the occasion of a remarkable demonstration. The welcome to the Republican candidate for vice president was non-partisan and of a great extent personal for the congressman's recovery from his recent illness has added a reason for public rejoicing upon his safe return.

Mr. Sherman, accompanied by Mrs. Sherman and Dr. Carter, reached here on the New York express from the west at 8:10 o'clock. As the train drew into the station bands played, fireworks were set off and church bells rang. In Baggs square and every other spot adjacent to the New York Central station, thousands of persons were crowded. Mr. Sherman stepped from the train slowly, looking pale and worn. But he had stood the journey very well, his physician said.

A procession formed in the vicinity of the station and escorted the candidate to his home. The line of march covered fully a mile, and the paraders included fraternal organizations. The route lay through the principal streets, the buildings of which were decorated with flags, streamers and motes, all illuminated by electric lights. A dozen bands furnished music, fireworks added a spectacular feature, and tens of thousands of persons ranged along the route shouting themselves hoarse.

At Mr. Sherman's house the formal welcome took place, the principal speaker being Mayor J. D. Kernan.

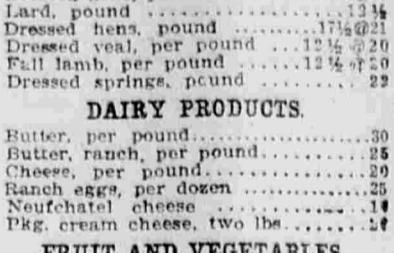
