FOREST ENGINEER HERE.

Chief Herring Says Damage by Fire Has Been Greatly Reduced.

Chief Engineer Herring of the Forest service is in the city from his headquarters at Washington, having come west to attend meetings of ser-vice officials and employes in the west-ern districts. Mr. Herring says that the service is keeping such close watch on forest fires that during the last year, the total loss from such causes amounted only to \$31,000, where in years gone by, the losses have run up into the millions. He also said that in the mountains of Colorado the great-est losses had been due to sparks from locomotives. No matter how care-fully a locomotive spark arrester is arranged, it does not prevent sparks from flying, as when an engine is taking steam the full length of her cylinder, she keeps her fire well stirred up, and sparks will fiy. Mr. Herring says there is no more trouble with campers, as the laws now are not only strict, but are also enforced, against leaving fires burning; and people have awakened to the fact that neglect is sure to be followed by arrest and a fine.
