teaching the Indians the Descret alpha-bet, teaching them the gospel, etc. He was with Jacob Hamblin's exploring company when George A. Smith, Jr., was shot by a Navajo Indian (Nov. 6, 1860). They carried him on a saddle mule as long as he could stand it when they placed him on the ground and staid with him until he died, but for fear of their own lives the company had to leave him unburied. Mr. Haskell spent the best years of his life as an Indian missionary, making friends of them, in which labor he was most successful. His family came to Manassa in 1886, he remaining at Bluff till the next year to help establish that settlement and especially to make friends of the Navajo and Ute Indians. He has since made his home in Manassa. He served as postmaster here for about 12 years. He was a devoted member of the Church throughout his remarkable ca-reer. His wife, two sons, four daugh-ters, 28 grandchildren, six great-grand-children and a host of friends are left to mourn his death and cherish his memory. teaching the Indians the Descret alphamemory.
