

## NEW POLITICAL PARTY LAUNCHED

Called "Liberal" and it is Formally Proclaimed in Chattanooga, Tenn.

### STRONG ON WOMAN SUFFRAGE

It Demands Several Constitutional Amendments—Denounces President, Bryan, Taft, Hearst.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 8.—In a convention of its organizers here today, the birth of the new Liberal party was formally proclaimed, and its platform of principles announced. The convention was called to order by Sidney C. Tapp, of Atlanta, the leader in the movement. Mr. Tapp urged that women be permitted to vote.

Charles J. Moore, of Atlanta, was made permanent chairman. The committee on resolutions made its report with little delay. The platform in part follows:

"We demand such amendments to the constitution of the various states of the Union and to the Constitution of the United States as will permit women to vote on equal basis, terms and conditions with men, and grant unto women all legal rights and privileges which are granted unto men under the law."

"We demand such constitutional amendments as may be necessary to provide a system of direct taxation to support the federal government."

"We demand that the initiative and referendum be adopted."

"We demand such legislation as will provide that when a citizen has accumulated millions of dollars by virtue of increase of population or other causes produced by the people, and his millions make him a menace to society, that a portion of his property and income thereby revert to the government to be

used in the support of the government and be distributed to the public for humanitarian purposes.

"We demand absolute separation of church and state and restoration of the church to a purely spiritual institution."

The platform then goes into a denunciation of Bryan, Taft, President Roosevelt and William R. Hearst and closes by urging all woman suffragists throughout the country to organize.

### REPUBLIC LIFE INS. CO. WILL BE REORGANIZED

Chicago, Oct. 9.—The Republic Life Insurance company of Illinois, the \$1,000,000 life insurance of the Rhodus Brothers, which was to have back of it the \$5,000,000 Central Life Securities company as a holding company, will be reorganized with a number of well known Chicago men at the head, and will enter actively into the insurance field.

The steps toward a reorganization of the company were taken last Monday in the United States circuit court when First F. Rhodus and the other officers and directors of the company capitulated to Judge Kohlsaat's ultimatum to the effect that the company would be placed in receivers' hands unless they retired, and when the court approved of the new officers selected by John C. Fetzer, receiver for the Central Life Securities company, to undertake the reorganization.

The new officers of the new Republic company are: President, John M. Roach, president of the Chicago Railways company. Vice president, Albert Bettinger, of Cincinnati.

Treasurer, John C. Fetzer, Chicago. Secretary, Joseph B. Fleming, Chicago.

Board of directors, Mr. Roach, Mr. Bettinger, Mr. Fetzer, Ralph Modjeski, Albert Hayden, N. Arneson and Francis S. Peabody.

The officers met yesterday to receive the resignations of Birch F. Rhodus, president, and the other offi-

cers and directors of the Republic Life Insurance company, and to fill their places.

The company will begin business with a cash account of \$143,890.

To these assets, Mr. Fetzer expects nearly \$500,000 will be added when the affairs of the Central Life Securities company are cleared up.

### METHODIST CHURCH WORK IN BULGARIA

New York, Oct. 9.—The board of foreign missions of the Methodist church in this country has sent a message to the Rev. E. E. Count, superintendent of the missions in Bulgaria, asking him to report at once the effects of the situation on church work and what is to be done in the event of Bulgaria becoming an independent nation. At the office of the board it is said that no trouble is expected. Prince Ferdinand is said to be liberal in his treatment of denominational interests. The mission field of Bulgaria as far as American work is concerned is divided between the Methodists and the Congregationalists. The latter denomination is represented there by a large church that, while teaching the precepts of the denomination is independent of the church in this country. According to the report made of these missions, the Methodists have property in Bulgaria valued at nearly \$100,000.

The estimated value of church buildings, mission chapels, etc., is \$19,515. Of these are eight native workers of the Women's Foreign Missionary society, 15 native ordained preachers, 532 members and probationers; 11 churches and chapels and 529 attending Sabbath school.

A TRAINLOAD OF PRISONERS. Washington, Oct. 9.—A special train will leave Washington late today for Fort Smith, Ark., carrying 100 prisoners, transferred from the United States jail here to the Fort Smith penitentiary, because of the crowded condition in the Washington institution. The transfer was directed by the department of justice. The prisoners are all long-term men. The special carries no sleeping cars. Two men are assigned to each double seat so that the seat in front can be turned over and the prisoners sleep as best they may.

## PROCEEDINGS NEVER SECRET

Those of Conventions of the American Federation of Labor, Says Mr. Gompers.

### HE EXPOSES A QUEER SCHEME

Corporations' Auxiliary Co. of Cleveland Made Mysterious Offer to Furnish Reports of Secret Sessions.

Washington, Oct. 9.—President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, has made public correspondence received by him relating to the proposition of the "Corporations' Auxiliary company" of the "Chamber of Commerce building, Cleveland, Ohio," to furnish a complete report of the entire proceedings of the convention, including "secret sessions" of the federation of labor to be held in Denver in November. In replying to those who forwarded letters from the Corporations' Auxiliary company to Mr. Gompers, he called attention to the fact that sessions of the convention of the American Federation of Labor are always open and the full proceedings provided to the press and all those desiring them.

The circular letter from the Corporations' Auxiliary company forwarded to Mr. Gompers had been received by A. M. Todd company, of Kanamazo, Michigan, and D. A. Reynolds, president of the Great Eastern Telephone company, of New York, and were addressed "personal and confidential." In part the circular letter reads:

"As usual, we expect to have several delegates present and will be in a position to furnish you, as the convention proceeds with a complete report of the entire proceedings, including secret sessions. In view of the fact that the A. F. of L. made demands this year upon both the Republican and Democratic nominating conventions and is actively entering into politics, and has put into this field an increased force of secret organizers, covering almost every branch of trade, this convention will undoubtedly be the most important ever held by the federation."

In his letter to D. A. Reynolds, Mr. Gompers says:

"For the past few years, about the first of October, the Corporations' Auxiliary company has sent out a letter similar in character to the one you sent me. It might not be amiss to call your attention to the fact that the conventions of the American Federation of Labor are always in open session; that facilities are always provided for the press representatives; that a number of the large city daily papers have representatives regularly in attendance at the convention and that the printed official proceedings of each day's session are given to any one who may care to have them."

### METHODIST VOTERS.

Baltimore, Oct. 8.—The legislative committee of the Temperance society of the Methodist Episcopal church, which is conducting a movement against the re-election not only as speaker, but also as a representative in Congress, of Joseph G. Cannon of Illinois, today gave out a letter addressed to "Methodist voters" for their guidance in the fight against Representative Cannon. The votes belonging to the Methodist communion in the speaker's district are advised to co-operate with temperance people of all other denominations through the Anti-Saloon league, which, the letter says, will now lead the fight against Mr. Cannon. Further, the committee urged that every Republican candidate for Congress be publicly asked whether he favors the re-election of Mr. Cannon as speaker, and his reply published in the newspapers of his district. The committee advises "in all cases that our people vote for the congressional candidate who most completely combines satisfactory record and attitude with probability of election and recommends that when neither the Republican nor the Democratic candidates are acceptable, the prohibition candidate for Congress be supported, as a protest and a demonstration of growing temperance sentiment."
