### Burial of the Maine Victims.

Washington, Dec. 16 .- Assistant Secretary of the Navy Allen having selected the place where the dead of the Maine are to be buried, is now making followed in the case of the Santiag-victims. Illinois Bigamist Sentenced. Springfield, Ill., Dec. 16 .- Germain F. Harrison, who was arrested at Toledo, Ohio, recently on the charge of bigamy, preferred by his wife, Miss Elsa Mc-Clure, a prominent society young lady of Virden, Ill., whom he married in Virden, August 25th last, today pleaded

guilty in the Macoupin county circuit court and was sentenced to the Chester penitentiary. He deserted Miss Mc-Clure at the Palmer House, Chicago, on his wedding trip and from the firm with whom Harrison was employed she learned that he had another undivorced wife living in Grand Rapids, Mich.

### Forgery, Just the Same.

Council Bluffs, Ia., Dec. 15.-Jack Shields, arraigned for forgery in the district court here today, owes his lib-erty to his ignorance of the different kinds of revenue stamps. It appeared in the trial that he had put a proprietary stamp on a forged check which he passed. Judge Green held that inasmuch as the check bore a proprietary and not a documentary stamp it could not be the subject of forgery and hav-ing no legal efficacy could not have been passed as a forged instrument. He ac-ordingit dismissed the same and or cordingly dismissed the case and or-dered the jury discharged. The case will be carried up to the Supreme court.

### Damphofer Sentence Commuted.

Washington, Dec. 15 .- Secretary Root has recommended commutation of the death sentence imposed by court-mar-tial upon Corp. Damphofer and two other soldiers of the Washington volun-teer regiment, who were convicted of ravishing Filipino women. The com-mutation recommended is imprisonment for twenty years. In making this recommendation, Secretary Root states specifically that he is satisfied of the legality of the original sentences, al-though they had been called in question
