JUDGE LEWIS

New Judge of Third District Replies to the Attorney General.

HE IS NOT AN INTRUDER.

Holds the Office by Virtue of His Appointment by the Governor Under New Law Passed by Legislature.

Judge Thomas D. Lewis today filed his answer to the quo warranto proceedings instituted against him in the supreme court several days ago by Attorney-General Breeden. He admits that he was appointed by Gov. Wells on April 7, and that he is now in possession of the office of judge of the Third district court and also admits all matters ser out in the complaint in con-

nection with his appointment. He denies that he wrongfully and unlawfully holds the office and exercises the duties and functions of the same, and that he has unlawfully intruded himself into the office or that he usurps the office and has no legal right to the same. The answer then sets out that the recent Legislature passed an act entitled "An act to increase the number of judges for the Third judicial district and for the appointment of one judge and for the appointment of one Judge, pending the next general election," which act is known as Chapter 55 of the Laws of Utah of 1903. The said act was approved by the governor on March 12, 1903, and became a law and is now in full force and effect.

In accordance therewith, Judge Lewis was appointed by Governor Wells on Appel 10, subscribed April 7, and on April 10, subscribed to the oath of office and entered his duties as judge. He alleges that he is now exercising the duties and func-

tions of the office by virtue of the law passed as aforesaid and by virtue of said appointment and not otherwise.

The date of the hearing has not as yet been set by the supreme court and will not be fixed until Justice Bartch returns to the city next week, but I will be heard during the coming week at any rate. That the law in connection with the case will be thoroughly gone into and that the arguments wi without doubt, as Judge Lewis has em ployed the leading counsel of the state to handle the case for him.
