

seekers. HE FAVORS VACCINATION.

Statistics Relied on to Show the Benefits of the Operation - Not a

Matter of Money.

Colonia Juarez, Chi., Mex., April 20th, 1900.

To the Editor: I desire to say a few words in regard to vaccination and smallpox through your valuable paper. My personal experience has been quite broad during the past two years with the disease smallpox and also vaccination, I have vaccinated over 1,000 people without one fatal result due to the cination. It must be remembered that vaccination does not insure immunity against other diseases than smallpox I have carefully investigated the case of all vaccinated and not one has been afflicted with the virulent disease small Although many of them were expox. posed to it while an epidemic was rag-ing in a settlement near by. At Casas Grandes there are about 2,500 people, and while an epidemic of smallpox was

raging in that town, and many children were dying daily of the confluent and malignant forms of the disease, yet ali those who had been vaccinated were It was impossible to quarantine the town and the surrounding settlements. -Juarez, Dublan and Nueva Casas Grandes were visited by men who had the dreaded disease in their families. Many cases were permitted to rue

Many cases were permitted to run about before the scales had entirely disappeared.

The more ignorant class of the na-tives maintain that the Lord sends this special disease, and they voluntarily expose themselves and their children. If they are stricken by the disease they patiently await the result, without employing medical aid, saying that the Lord will spare them if he does not want them to die. In other diseases they employ medical aid early and frepoently. The natives of this country at irst fought vaccination as an abomination, but at present the law makes it compulsory, and many flock to the vac-cine stand. We know that good hy-gienic surroundings increase the vital-

ity of people and make them less sus-ceptible to diseases. Judging from per-sonal observation I do not believe that any degree of cleanliness of the individual, or of hygiene in the household, or of municipal sanitation, will protect the susceptible against contracting smallpox if exposed to its contracting The most certain and only safe guard which has stood the crucial test for

over 100 years is effective vaccination. over 100 years is encetive vaccination. It is a disease of all diseases most positively preventable. (2) An eruption which feels ike shot under the skin before it shows local color, choosing preferably exposed surfaces, but likely to be found any vhere, on the palms and soles and face 3) Fall of temperature, or even a sense of perfectly restored comfort, when the eruption appears, and a rise of temperature when the eruption matures.

SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY. The dangerous character of wood al-

cohol seems to be little understood, but has been emphasized within recent months by a number of painful experiences. Not only have small doses of the commercial spirit resured in death but from two to five teaspoonfuls have produced total blindness through atro hy of the optic nerve. Even inhalation of the vapor has caused serious impairment of vision. The poisenous effects do not depend on impurities, as is proven by the reported case of a young man convalescing from measles, who surreptitiously drank four ounces of highly purified wood alcohol, and after recovering from the intoxication emained so nearly blind that he could barely distinguish light and shadow.

Attempts to make "living pictures" have been traced backward about twenty centuries in a recent book by H. Hopwood. As early as 1851 a Brit ish patent was issued for the making of instantaneous pictures of moving ob-jects, and from that time to 1895 there vere patented 59 other inventions. the next two years not less than 106 Inventions were patented. The satis factory work of reproducing the figure in motion belongs to the latter period yet the century closes with this art) a highly perfected stage,

The discovery of many dead rats around some casks of fermenting mo-lasses has given a French genius a novel idea. He suggests that rats on shipborad may be destroyed by filling the bilges with carbonic acid gas from cylinders of the compressed fluid, and points out that the asphyxlating gas has no warning odor, while it is harmless to ship and cargo.

The surveys for the Transcasplan rallway were made by the photographic method, and, while the cost proved to be only a third as great as the usual survey, much time also was saved.

The image on an ordinary photographic plate is a precipitate of amor-phous silver, and M. Trillot has sought to change this silver into thin superposed laminae, with the idea that color effects would then result from the phenomenon of interference. He has effected the change by exposing the plate to nitric acid vapor until all trace if the image disappears, then exposin to moist hydrogen sulphide until the image is again brought out properly The silver is thus converted to a lamin ated condition, and by reflected light the image shows strong and fairly sla ble colors, which, however, have definite relation to natural colors, t is possible so to localize certain colors as to give an approach to those of the objects represented. In the experiments already made, M. Trillot has localized green, red and white upon the proper parts of an image showing follage, a red-tiled roof and white walls. and he looks for considerably greater success with this system of photograph-

In his studies of slow motions, Prof. Chas. S. Slichter, by means of kinetoscope pictures, has so magnified the motions that the growth of seedli and beans during three weeks is shown in a few seconds. The plants were photographed on the kinetoscope film by artificial light at intervals of a few minutes to a few hours during the three weeks. On projecting the pictures upon the screen at the usual rate, the motion of growth was magnified about 500,000 times, and the different rates of development of the various parts were brought out very clearly. Among the

striking results was the curlous be-havior of a pea struggling to enter impenatrable soil, the root curving and writhing much like an angle worm, while the pea rolled about very grotesquely,

A case of green vision, everything seen appearing to be green in color, has been brought before the British Ophthalmological society by H. W. Dodd, and records have been found of thirteen other cases. The condition was not one peculiar to age or sex, and i was not due to errors of refraction.
