UTAH. POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT, Washington, Sep. 30, 1869.

PROVISIONAL will be received until the 31st of March 1, 1870, for conveying the mails of the United States, from June 30, 1871, in the Territory of Utah, on the routes and by the schedules of departures and arrivals herein specified.

- 10001 From Salt Lake City, by Big Cottonwood, Union, Draper, Salt City, American Fork, Springville, Payson, Santaquin, Mona, Salt Creek, Chicksen Creek, Round Valley, Kaysville, Fillmore City, 120 miles and back, six times a week the route.

INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS AND POSTMASTERS. Containing the conditions to be incorporated in the contracts to be let by the Department.

1. Seven minutes are allowed to each intermediate office, when not otherwise specified, for ascertaining the mails; but on railroad and steamboat routes it is to be no more than five minutes.

2. On railroad and steamboat lines, the route agents of the Department, also the British and Canada mails, when offered, and the agents accompanying them; are to be conveyed without charge, in the same manner as the United States agents.

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4. No pay will be made for trips not performed, for each of such cases, except in the case of a contractor, who, for reasons beyond his control, is unable to perform the same.

5. The Postmaster General may annul the contract for repeated failures to run agreeably to contract; for violating the post office laws, or for disobeying the instructions of the Department; for refusing to discharge a carrier when required by the Department to do so; for running an engine or train, or for transporting persons or packages conveying mail matter out of the mail.

6. The Postmaster General may order an increase of service on a route by allowing therefor a pro rata increase on the contract pay. He may change schedules of departures and arrivals, and may, in particular, make the routes conform to connections with railroads, without increase of pay, provided the running time be not increased, or the Postmaster General may, in his judgment, nullify any such discontinuance or suspension for any other cause; he may, in his discretion, suspend the contractor from running on any route, or suspend him from running on any route, or suspend him from running on any route, or suspend him from running on any route.
