PAYSON CITY, March 17, 1873.
Editor Deseret News:

We have had a very enjoyable time here this winter. Our Philomathean Society meet every Monday evening. Many of our young people attend and take great interest in it. We also publish the *Philomathean Gazette*, which is ably edited by Mr. John Redington. The matter is most original. The society is presided over by Bro. Wm. G. Evans.
Our Sunday Schools are in a prosperous condition. Over three hundred children are attending these schools. We have one Bible class for the old and young, which meets separately from the large school. Our bishop and the superintendent are taking a lively interest in the same.
There has been some sickness of late. The prospect for fruit is good. We have done no ploughing yet, as the ground is very wet. The mail has been running irregularly of late, but now has begun its daily trips.
Our day schools are also well attended. In fact, there is more interest in the education of the youth than formerly. We also have a Legal Institute organized, which holds weekly meetings and holds fair.

WEST INDIES.

HAVANA, 10.—On the strength of cable dispatches from London, the police here have arrested Austin Byron Bidwell, alias Warren his wife, and Harry Mun, a servant. Bidwell is supposed to be the principal operator in the recently discovered fraud on the bank of England, and answers to the description telegraphed by the London Police. Travelling with an American passport, he went through France into Spain and reached Santander, where he embarked on a French steamer for Havana. The steamer arrived here on Saturday, when the whole party was taken into custody. Bidwell and his servant Mun are in jail and forbidden to hold communication with any one, or each other. The lady was permitted to remain at the hotel, where she is under surveillance of the police. Although there is no extradition treaty between Spain and England, the authorities will send the whole party back to London if proper proofs are furnished, a detective is expected from England soon to identify and take in charge the prisoners. It is stated that the confessions of Moyes the confederate now under arrest in London, fully implicates Bidwell in the forgery.
