THE 17TH WORLD'S FAIR.

Two months ago the House of Representatives of the United States, by a vote of 171 yeas to 127 nays, passed the bill for the 17th World's Fair, which was to be held in Las Vegas, N. M., in 1894.

The truth of the matter is, the Legislature had no intention to pass the bill, and it was only a question of time before it would be withdrawn.

It is not enough to say that the right of the Governor to appoint all officers of the Territory not otherwise provided for in the Organic Act, has been withdrawn by the bill.

The Governor considered his authority implied by the act of the Legislature, and refused to sign the bill.

Now, we do not charge that the Governor exceeded what he believed to be his legitimate authority.

On the other hand, it is not for us to say that the Governor was wrong in his refusal to sign the bill.

What the House will do with it, we do not know.

What the Senate will do with it, we do not know.
