

## SENATOR ALDRICH ON EXPENDITURES

He is in Favor of Reducing Public Expenses so as to Fit Government's Normal Revenues.

IDEA BEING WELL RECEIVED.

Day Payne Bill Passes House, Tariff Bill as Amended by Senate Committee Will Be Ready to Report.

Washington, March 24.—The tariff bill to be amended by the senate committee on finance will be ready to be reported on the day the Payne bill passes the house, according to present intentions of the Republican members of the committee, who are holding daily sessions. Consideration of the schedules on earthenware and pottery was begun and concluded today.

Ideas presented by Senator Aldrich yesterday in favor of reducing public expenditures so as to fit the normal revenues of the government rather than expanding the income to growing extravagance, is receiving general support among senators. It is now believed it will be possible to avoid all forms of special taxes, especially as government officials are counting confidently upon better industrial conditions throughout the country as soon as disposition is made of the tariff legislation.

Few controversies between Republican members of the finance committee are anticipated. The tariff experts in the employ of the committee, it is said, regard such questions as those of free lumber, and free hides as purely "sentimental," being convinced that placing them on the free list would subtract little from the revenues of the country, and that the importations would be so infinitesimal as not to either appreciably enter into competition with American lumber and American hides.

As the result of the harmony which exists behind the locked doors of the finance committee rooms the impression is growing that the tariff law will be made in conference after bills have passed both houses. These conferences may continue for several weeks. The senate committee will begin holding night sessions within a few days.

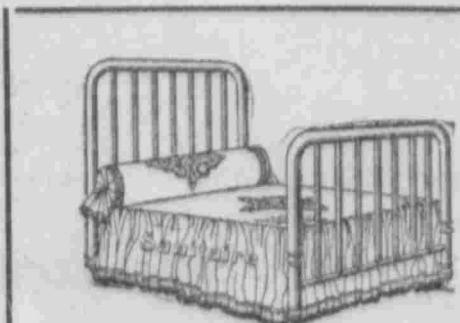
## BROWNVILLE AFFAIR.

Howland, Twenty-first Infantry, was named as recorder of the court. The time and place of the meeting of the court have not yet been determined, but it is expected the court will be in this city in the course of a few days.

## LAGUNA DAM.

Last Carload of Rock Has Been Dumped on Apron.

Yuma, Ariz., March 25.—The last car load of rock has been dumped into the apron of Laguna dam and the great diversion weir is being cleared of all its construction equipment preparatory to the opening celebration on March 30 and 31.

Laguna dam extends across the Colorado river and is located about 11 miles above the city of Yuma. It was built by the United States reclamation service at a cost of more than a million dollars. The dam is not a storage basin, but a diversion weir, which allows the water to pass through sluice gates on either side of the river into main channels from which many laterals and ditches will extend over about 150,000 acres under the Yuma project.

Work on the dam was commenced in July, 1905. The dam is 4,770 feet long.

## ASTRONOMER PERRINE.

Called from Lick Observatory to Directorship of Argentine.

San Jose, Cal., March 25.—Charles D. Perrine, of the Lick observatory staff has been called to the directorship of the Argentine republic's national observatory at Cordoba. He plans to leave early in April to assume his duties in the southern hemisphere.

He was in charge of the Crocker expedition to Sumatra in 1901, and was chief assistant to Director Campbell at the solar eclipse of 1905, in Georgia, 1905, in Spain and in 1905, in Flint island.

## VON BUELOW'S COALITION FALLS

Conservatives Will Carry Through Financial Reforms Without Considering Majority.

SIMPLY MEANS CLERICAL AID.

Court Clique Have Been Doing All in Their Power to Undermine The Chancellor.

Berlin, March 25.—Prince von Buelow's coalition of the Conservative, Liberal and Radical parties apparently has reached a fatal crisis over the scheme of financial reform. In the reichstag yesterday Herr von Normann, the Conservative leader on the floor, informed the leader of the National Liberals, Herr Bassermann, that the Conservatives were determined to carry through financial reform without considering whether they would get a majority. This evidently means with the assistance of the Clerical party, which the government has taboed since the dissolution in 1906.

## Herr Bassermann said:

"You intend that as giving notice of the termination of the bloc."

Herr von Normann in reply said: "The bloc will remain for other national purposes."

The National Liberals, however, held a caucus later and voted unanimously to regard the Conservative communication as serving notice of the dissolution of the bloc. The caucus also decided to adhere to the Liberal program that taxes upon articles of general consumption cannot be accepted without some taxation upon especially the wealthy classes, but the Conservative leader's statement included the complete rejection of such a tax, as well as an estate duty on property of deceased persons.

The Conservatives also served similar notice on the Radicals. This action caused a great sensation in the lobby of the reichstag toward the close of the day's session when it became known.

This means the abandonment of Chancellor von Buelow by his own party to join the Clericals, who latterly have been fiercely attacking the chancellor because he only half-heartedly defended the emperor in the November debate.

It is also known that the court clique have been moving heaven and earth for some time past to undermine Prince von Buelow with the emperor.

## COLORADO GETS BUSY.

Wants National Executive Mansion Erected at Glenwood Springs.

Washington, March 25.—Because Colorado is the "nation's playground," according to ex-President Roosevelt, Representative Taylor of that state has introduced a bill appropriating \$250,000 for the erection of an executive mansion at Glenwood Springs, Colo. This building will be for the use of the president and his family during the summer months. Glenwood is near the scene of Mr. Roosevelt's hunt in 1907. Mr. Taylor, who is a new member in the house, is quite liberal with bills that seek to provide public buildings for his district. He wants a postoffice, land office, forestry service and other federal offices provided with a building at Glenwood Springs. In addition he wants a monument erected to the memory of Gen. DeWitt Clinton, a cultural experiment station. He also has introduced a bill providing for the expenditure of \$300,000 for the erection of monuments over the graves of deceased ex-presidents.

## NEW WAY TO SMUGGLE.

New York, March 25.—Customs house officers believe they have discovered a novel method for smuggling goods ashore. It is charged that a trunk containing goods valued at \$5,000 was swung ashore from the American liner Philadelphia recently by means of a pulley and pulley. By this method a trunk or box might be hoisted quietly from a vessel and carried along the wire to an adjoining pier where there was no boat and consequently no customs inspectors. How often this scheme has been worked is a matter of conjecture. Robert Schwartz, baggage-master of the American line, was arrested and another employee of the company was detained as a witness. Both men are locked up in the Tombs.

## WIRELESS OPERATORS SCARCE.

New York, March 25.—The scarcity of competent wireless operators was emphasized in Hoboken, N. J., yesterday when authorities of the North German-Lloyd line made frantic endeavors to obtain the release of Kurt Schieder, the operator on the steamer Friedrich Wilhelm, who was arrested in Hoboken yesterday on a charge of exhibiting a pistol in the streets. Jack Binns, the hero of the Republic disaster, was sent by the Marconi company to plead for Schieder, but the magistrate declined to free the offender and ordered that he be locked up until the grand jury could hear his case. A representative of the North German-Lloyd line said that Schieder's detention would probably mean that the Friedrich Wilhelm would sail unprotected by a wireless operator, but the court remained obdurate.

## MRS. EFFIE DUDEN CLEARED OF CHARGE OF MURDER

San Diego, Cal., March 24.—Mrs. Effie Duden, charged with the murder in this city on Jan. 29 last of her brother-in-law, Bruce Shaffer, was acquitted today by jury after two hours and a half deliberation.

Immediately following the reading of the verdict by the clerk, a storm of hisses, mingled with the handclapping of Mr. Duden's relatives and friends, came from every part of the room. Judge Lewis rapped for order and threatened to clear the court room if the demonstrators did not cease.

When Mrs. Duden heard the verdict she started up and turned to her husband, who took her in his arms. Then he broke down and cried like a child. Mrs. Duden's emotion, so plainly visible before the jury reported and before the verdict was read, seemed to fade when she heard the words "not guilty," and she received the congratulations of her relatives and friends in a calm manner.

## FREE SANITARIUM.

Philanthropist Gives Half a Million Dollars for Establishing One.

New York, March 25.—A philanthropist has donated \$500,000 for the establishment of a free sanitarium at Chappaqua, Westchester county, north of this city, for sick and crippled children. Announcement was made last night by the Children's Aid society. The buildings and grounds of a former boarding school will be used for the purpose and will be ready by June 15. It will accommodate 500 children. The grounds consist of 75 acres and the society has already expended \$150,000 for improvements and alterations.

## YOUNG TAFT PRESIDENT.

New Haven, Conn., March 25.—Robert A. Taft, son of the president, has been elected president of the City Government club of Yale. At a meeting held last night he was also chosen as one of four delegates to the national convention which will be held in New York on April 1 and adjourn to meet in Washington the following day.

## BOYS TELL A WILD TALE OF A WILD RIDE

Los Angeles, March 25.—Relating a wild tale of abduction and a mad automobile ride through the Crescent Bay beach city, five Los Angeles school-boys who disappeared yesterday afternoon and for whom scores of relatives and friends searched throughout the city last night, were located about midnight in Venice.

The boys, whose ages range from 9 to 11, claim they were taken from the city by two men who asked them if they wanted a ride through the city. Despite severe cross-questionings by the Venice police, the boys could not be shaken from their statements. They said they had repeatedly asked the men to be allowed to get out of the machine when they saw it was being driven out of town. Their pleadings, the boys say, were answered with threats of violence. It was only when the automobile broke down between Santa Monica and North Palm that the boys had a chance to escape. They were found on the Venice beach and turned over to the authorities.

## INSURRECTION IN REPUBLICAN RANKS

One in House of Representatives Absolutely Refuses to be Subdued.

RULES A STUMBLING BLOCK.

Committee Wants to Limit Changes in The Payne Bill to Committee Amendments.

Washington, March 24.—Like a South American revolution, the insurrection in the Republican ranks in the house refuses to be subdued. While there is no apparent indication of any movement on the part of the "insurgents" to reopen their fight, it is known that no rule to limit amendments to the tariff bill has been brought in because of the uncertainty of the intentions of Representative Murdock of Kansas and the other "insurgents." It is understood that the rule committee is merely awaiting a favorable opportunity to bring in a rule which will limit the changes in the Payne bill to committee amendments.

This rule, which probably will be presented before the next week, will not shut off the reading of the tariff bill under the five-minute rule, but is proposed as a means of preventing unnecessary delay in bringing about its passage. As several Republican members have announced their intention of forcing record votes on certain proposed amendments, it may also be the purpose of the rule to prevent such votes being taken.

The proposed rule would be opposed by a large number of Republican and Democratic alike, but as it would prevent votes being taken for the purpose of putting members on record with regard to certain schedules, it might receive the support of those Republicans who desire to offer amendments to the bill.

Champ Clark and the minority members of the ways and means committee have announced their intention of opposing any rule which will tend to limit the offering of amendments. The Democratic leaders would, in that case, expect the "insurgents" to stand by them. The adoption of the rule would also require the Democratic "bolters" to go on record again. The "insurgents" believe that all of the southern Democrats who voted for the Fitzgerald amendment would vote with their fellow Democrats.

## PORTLAND, OR., MAY ADOPT SALOON TRUST

San Francisco, March 25.—A special from Portland, Or., states that the Gothenberg system of placing all saloons under one ownership may be adopted by that city. An association is seeking a 10-year franchise for which it has offered the city \$25,000 a year for the first five years, and \$40,000 for the last five. It promises to reduce the number of saloons from 400 to 250 and to regulate them. An initiative petition for a law granting them this privilege is being circulated.

## DUKE GWIN'S DAUGHTER DEAD.

San Francisco, March 25.—Miss Carolyn Kip, daughter of the late William M. Gwin, first United States senator from the state of California, died in this city yesterday. While her father was in Washington, Miss Gwin was one of the notable members of the little coterie known as the "White House set." Besides her social activities, the late Miss Gwin was widely known as a charity worker, being for many years president of the Maria Kip orphanage.

## GOV. DICKERSON SIGNS TALLMAN BANK ACT

Carson, Nev., March 24.—Gov. Dickerson has signed the Tallman banking act, the mining inspector bill, the anti-gambling bill and the juvenile court bill.

The banking act, though not including the guaranty feature, is almost the same in effect. Its vital feature is the following:

"Every officer and director of any banking corporation who shall violate any provision of this act shall be civilly liable for damages to any person injured thereby, and shall likewise be liable to the guaranty deposit fund of such corporation for the amount of money paid out to the depositors therein."

The anti-gambling act provides that on and after October, 1910, no license shall be issued for any gambling game, and makes it a misdemeanor to play any game for money.
