UNITED STATES TO CHINA AND RUSSIA

Will Not Permit Integrity of Celestial Empire to be Molested.

ALL TO BE TREATED ALIKE.

One Nation Not to be Favored to Detriment of Another - Causes Big Sensation in Pekin Diplomatic Circles.

Chicago, Feb. 20 .- The Tribune today prints the following cablegram from Pekin, China, under date of Feb. 19: A sensation was caused in diplomatic circles here today when it became known that the United States, through Secy, of State John Hay, had sent a note to the Russlan and Chinese governments following closely along the lines of the Anglo-Japanese treaty of

Jan. 30. The note is a distinct warning to both China and Russia that the United States will not permit the integrity of the empire to be molested in favor of one nation to the detriment of another. The note, which practically indorses the English treaty with Japan, says:

Washington, D. C., Feb. 1.-An agreement whereby China gives any agreement whereby China gives any corporation or company the exclusive right or privilege of opening mines, establishing railroads or in any other way industrially developing Manchuria can but be viewed with the greatest concern by the government of the United States.

It constitutes a monopoly which is a distinct breach of the stipulation of the treatiler concluded between China and the foreign powers, and thereby seriously affects the rights of American citizens. It restricts their rightful trade, ex-

osing it to be discriminated against, interfered with or otherwise jeoparlized, and strongly tends to permanent tends to permanently impairing Chi na's sovereign rights in this part of the empire, while it seriously interferes with her ability to meet international bligations.

Furthermore, such a concession or the Chinese part would undoubtedly be followed by demands from other powers for similar equal extensive ad-vantages elsewhere in the Chinese empire, and the inevitable result must be the complete wreck of the policy of absolute equality of treatment to nil and commerce within the empire's con-

'On the other hand, the attainment by one power of such exclusive privi-leges for the commercial organizations of its nationality conflicts with the as-surances repeatedly conveyed to this government by the imperial Russian ministry of foreign affairs of the imperlai government's intention to fol-low the policy of the open door, as ad-recated by the government of the United States and accepted by all the treaty powers having commercial incrosts in the empire.

TO SOUND THE PACIFIC.

Route for a Cable Line is to be Lo cated.

New York, Feb. 20 .- To take sound ings in the Pacific ocean from near San Francisco to the Hawalian islands thence to the Ladrones and from there to the Philippines, for the projected Pa cific cable, the Titus, a 120 ton seagoing tug will leave New York within a fer days. Stops probably will be made a Valparaiso and Panama. One of the government's most trusted transpor captains who had a knowledge of th soundings and mathematics, has just arrived here from the Philippines for the purpose of taking the Titus out. He expects to began taking sound ings about the end of April, and to complete this task by the end of May For ascertaining depths a new device will be used.
