## CASES IN THE DISTRICT COURT

**Wm. Frank Fielding Dismissed On One Felony Charge and Arrested on Another.**

### WANTS EXPERIMENT STATION

**Movement to Bring Station at Lehi to Weber County—County Salary Increased—Suit for Divorce.**

Ogden, Utah, Jan. 22.—Ordered removed from custody after a felony charge had been dismissed and to be immediately re-arrested upon a similar charge is the experience that befell William Frank Fielding in this city yesterday afternoon. The young man now waits in the county jail for an officer from Seattle, Washington, where he will be taken to face the charge. When the district court, with Judge Howell on the bench, convened yesterday Fielding was arraigned upon the charge of obtaining \$300 from the First National bank of this city under false pretenses. He waived the reading of the information and District Attorney Harris moved to dismiss the case announcing that it was impossible to secure a conviction. In accordance with the motion Judge Howell dismissed the case and ordered the release of Fielding.

Before the young man left the courtroom he was immediately re-arrested by Sheriff Wilson upon a complaint charging forgery alleged to have been committed in Seattle wherein he is charged with having forged the name of another man to a check for \$500. It is stated that an officer from the northwest is on route to the city.

Pending Fielding's appearance in the district court he was released under \$1,000 bond, his mother being one of the principal sureties. It is understood that his mother settled with the Ogden Savings Bank of this city which was the complainant in the case and had the complaint withdrawn. Fielding has a wife and child living in Salt Lake City from whom he claims he thought he was divorced. In Ogden he met an Ogden girl and married her. After securing the money from the Ogden bank he went to Seattle, where he was arrested. He secured money from the Seattle bank which is now seeking his conviction. Fielding was arrested in Oakland and brought to this city last spring.

### INFORMATION FILED.

Dist. Atty. Harris has filed with the clerk of the district court information against R. E. Blumfield, B. J. McIntire and J. H. Garrett, charging them with robbery. The trio are the proprietors of the Apex saloon on lower Twenty-fifth street, where they claim he was robbed about a month ago. At a preliminary hearing concluded in the police court before Judge Murphy, the defendants were found guilty and bound over to the district court.

### SUIT FOR DIVORCE.

Mary Kuehler Schille has brought suit for divorce in the district court against Joseph Schille upon the grounds of cruelty and failure to provide for the maintenance of the defendant. The complaint alleges that they were married in Cleveland, O., Nov. 16, 1907, and that since the marriage the defendant has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner; that he has refused to provide for her maintenance and support; that he has failed to provide the common necessities of life that he is employed in the Southern Pacific shops in this city and owns real estate in this city to the probable value of \$1,500. A dissolution of the bonds of matrimony, together with attorneys' fees and costs, are asked for by the plaintiff.

### WANTS EXPERIMENT STATION.

Bluth, chief deputy in the county clerk's office, was increased \$20, making it now \$100 per month. The salary of John Huteben, deputy sheriff, was made \$90, an increase of \$10 over the former salary.

**Held for Burglary.**—Robert E. Gleason, charged with burglary in the third degree, was arraigned in the police court before Judge Murphy and waived the preliminary hearing was bound over to the district court under a \$500 bond. Gleason is charged with entering a rooming house and stealing some clothes and shoes.

**Wedding Permit.**—A marriage license has been issued to Albert P. Trask of Evanston and Katherine Thompson of Ogden.

**Heavy Rains in West.**—Reports received last evening at the local railroad offices are to the effect that heavy rains are continuing through Nevada and California, and it is feared that there will be a heavy addition to the immense amount of damage to the railroad tracks by floods. It is stated that almost every little mountain stream is a river and some of the sections on the track of the Southern Pacific in Nevada are in danger of being flooded.

**Back to School.**—John and Ralph Gardner, the two boys who escaped from the state industrial school last Monday, who were captured in Pocatello, have been returned to that institution. When entering the school one of the boys said that he was glad to get back and that traveling by the boxcar route is a hard one.

**Victim Contract.**—E. H. Dundas of Salt Lake City, is in the city arranging for the machinery and tools which will be used in the construction work of the viaduct, of which he has secured the contract. He states that he will have the tools and cranes sent here from Salt Lake and will begin work the forepart of the week.

**Lincoln Services in Churches.**—A committee of the local G. A. R. has addressed communications to the pastors of churches of all denominations in Ogden to have suitable Lincoln services on Sunday, February 7.

**Subject for Deportation.**—J. C. Hise, immigration inspector for the United States, is in the city on the case of Luigi Del Carlo, an insane Italian, who is held at the county jail and whom it is thought is in this country in violation of the immigration laws.

### RAILROAD NEWS.

**KEEP TAB ON SNOWSLIDES.**  
 Orders from Kruttschnitt to Maintain Hourly Patrol on Southern Pacific.

The Southern Pacific railroad will hereafter maintain a constant vigil along the sections of its line on the Salt Lake division subject to snow and landslides. Orders from the headquarters of Julius Kruttschnitt, director of maintenance and operation of the Harriman lines at Chicago, to the effect that in the future the entire trackage of the Salt Lake division of the Southern Pacific railroad will be patrolled by men equipped with the lookout for landslides, washouts and other impediments to safe traffic. This order came as the result of the snow-sliding of the west bound Overland limited several days ago, when it ran dangerously near a landslide.

The orders include careful inspection hourly of every section of the entire division, something which has not been done in the past, although officials have continuously claimed that a great benefit would ensue as a result. Local officials say that the order was issued at the instigation of Edward Harriman himself, it having come to his notice that a wreck which would have resulted seriously was only avoided through the presence of mind of the engineer in charge of the train.

### MORE IDLE CARS.

**Latest Report Available Shows an Increase of 110,942 in Two Weeks.**

The committee on car efficiency of the American Railway association, in its statement of car surpluses and shortages as of Jan. 6, 1909, shows a total of 33,017 surplus cars, an increase of 110,942 in the two weeks since its last report. A similar increase was shown in the corresponding report for 1908, and it is accounted for by the usual holiday recession. There was a further slight decline in the number of "idle" cars, but as this item is now rather close to normal, large decreases cannot be expected. Taken by groups, the increase seems to be general. There was a large increase in "empty" (Canadian) which was partly due to the addition of 5,000 cars by a line that had not reported for several previous periods.

The grand total of surplus cars on Jan. 6, 1909, reporting, was 116,255. Box cars, 55,333; flat cars, 117,684; gondolas and hopper, and 44,937 other kinds. 332,019 cars in all. Shortages were 170 box cars; 30 flat cars; 120 coal, gondola and hopper cars, and 14 other kinds, making a total of 206.

This left a net surplus on Jan. 6 of 33,017 cars, the largest number recorded since June 10, when 348,567 net idle cars were reported. In reports previous to that time the net amount of idle equipment shown in each report ranged from around 200,000 to above 400,000, the highest number being given on April 20—418,333. The lowest number reported in any two weeks' report was that of Oct. 28, when 104,674 net idle cars were given. From that time on, however, there has been an increase shown in each succeeding report. The bulk of the increase shown in the surplus cars was in box and coal, that of flat and "other kinds" being only nominal.

### SPIKE AND RAIL.

Colombus, Ind.—It is reported that Denver & Rio Grande, Colorado & Southern railroads will meet the Harriman colonies in effect March 1, from Missouri river points to California and Pacific coast points. The rates will be in effect two months, and the amount approximately a little over 1 cent a mile. It is expected many of the eastern people will stop over at Salt Lake, as liberal stop-over privileges have been allowed at this point.

Reservations are coming in daily for berths on the excursion, and two additional diners have been added to the outfitment, making a total of six dining cars now engaged for the trip.

### H. G. TABER ARRESTED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 21.—Homer G. Taber former president of the United States Bank of Los Angeles, former president of the International Bank of Searchlight, Nev., and now president of the San Diego Bank and Trust company, was taken into custody in San Diego this evening, according to word received by the sheriff and will be brought here and then taken to Pioche, the seat of Lincoln county, Nevada, to answer to 15 indictments found by the grand jury and said to involve the embezzlement of \$150,000.

It is said only these indictments saved Taber from having to answer to a serious charge in this county of embezzling \$40,000 worth of telephone bonds, from Grant 41, of San Diego. This transaction was completed when he was president of the Westside bank in this city, and according to the story, Dist. Atty. Fredrick was ready to issue a warrant on an indictment by the grand jury for the arrest of Taber when the requisition from the governor of Nebraska took precedence.

At the same time this afternoon that Taber was taken into custody at the Westside bank and cashier of the Lincoln National Bank of Searchlight, was arrested in Pasadena and brought to this city and locked in the county jail.

### MARRIED IN SPITE OF ADVERSE EVENTS

Chicago, Jan. 22.—Battling bravely against an adverse fate which seemed determined to prevent her marriage, Miss Isabelle Sparks, of Kenosha county, Wisconsin, has finally triumphed and is now Mrs. Philip New. **HOLLAND SOCIETY DINNER.**  
 President Told Dutch Minister London To Attend It.

New York, Jan. 22.—John Kerr London, the minister of the Netherlands to this country, was one of the principal speakers last night at the annual dinner of the Holland society at the Waldorf Astoria for which more than 400 descendants of the early Dutch settlers of New York assembled. Mr. London said he was able to be present at the dinner only through an incident typical of President Roosevelt, explaining this, he said that being a diplomat he had been invited to attend a function at the White House last night, an incident which he could hardly refuse without embarrassment. In his predicament he went to the president and explained the situation. With characteristic candor he said, the president struck one hand with his fist and replied: "A dinner of the Holland society—by all means go."
