Dr. Daniel H. Calder Appointed Assistant Physician of the Institution.

Dr. Calder is a Salt Lake man, now in the East filling a similar position in an asylum, to the one to which he has been appointed here, and it will be his duty under the appointment made yesterday. Dr. Calder's salary was not voted by the board.

The board discussed the plans for the new building and the matter was referred to the Architect Watkins and Engineer Homer, with a view to having them prepare the most advantageous and economical method of applying the

amounts of money appropriated by the legislature which was not so great as the asylum board asked for; therefore the plans of improvements will have to be changed.

PERISHED IN THE SNOW.

Sad Fate of Young Hyrum Nelson—Sufferings Of His Rescuers.

Young Man Was Being Brought Home Sick, but Died on the Way of Cold and Exposure.

Heber, Wasatch Co., March 19.—While trapping in the mountains near the headwaters of the Duchesne river, Hyrum Nelson, the 19-year-old son of Wiley Nelson, of Heber, near this city, perished from cold and exposure last Sunday, while two companions, half frozen and almost exhausted, tried to drag him on a sled over the snow-covered mountains to a settlement 20 miles away. His companions, says a Herald special, Daniel Nelson and Thomas Wright, after enduring untold hardships and exposure, got to the place where they found the body of their friend, but they were unable to get him to the settlement.
