REMNANT OF THE OLD SIXTEENTH

Military Organization Well Known To Salt Lakers En Route For Eastern Posts.

PASS THROUGH THIS MORNING

Of the Original Band Who Made the Dash Up San Juan Hill, Only a Fra Bemnin.

The Sixteenth infantry, a military or ganization well known to Sait Lakers. passed through this city early this morn ing, en route from Manila. The Sixteent's was once stationed at Fort Douglas, and many people here would have been glad to have the regiment again occupy the past on the east seach. It is not probable that many of the men who were in it in the old days eenth went from here to Cuba in 1898, o engage in the Spanish-American war, and of the 400 that participated in the auth of San Juan hill, 118 were left lead upon the field. Of the wounded, dead mon the field. Of the wounded, doubtiess many have since crossed the great divide, and the unhealthy climes of the West India isless and again of the far away Philippines have decimated the members of the Sixteenth, and these conditions, coupled with the fact that many of the men have served their time and retired to private life, warrants the statement that only a remnant of the old organization now remains.

HOMEWARD TRIP.

The Sixteenth left Manila Aug. 14, and arrived in San Francisco 32 days later. During the voyage, the Sixth cavairy, bound for the Philippines, was communicated with by wireless telegraphy 400 miles from the Golden Gate, but the Twenty-ninth infantry, also the saw the saw destination. the same destination.

REGIMENT ARRIVES.

The Sixteenth arrived in Salt Lake in three sections, a section for each battalien of the regiment. The head-quarters, band and two battalions go to Fort Crook, near Omaha, and the third battalion will be stationed at Fort Root, near Little Rock, Ark.

CHEYENNE CITIZEN DEAD.

W. D. Pease, Formerly City Engineer, Succumbs to Heart Failure.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Sept. 19.-W. Di Pease, one of the oldest residents of Cheyenne, and for many years city encheyenne, and for many years city engineer, died suddenly at the Granite Springs reservoir, 28 miles west of the city yesterday, presumably of heart militre due to high altitude. Engineer Peass has been at the big reservoir for several days attending to business, he being superintendent of Cheyenne's water-works system. He was in good health when he left the city and his relatives and friends were shocked to learn of his sudden death. Mayor Cook, Coroner Murray and representatives of the G. A. R. and other organizations of which deceased was a member, have gone to the reservoir to investigate and bring the remains home. Engineer Pease was one of Cheyenne's earliest settlers. He took a leading part in the work of giving to Cheyenne's earliest settlers. He took a leading part in the work of giving to Cheyenne its present splendid system of waterworks and sewers. He was also prominent in public improvement campaigns, and was one of the city's most belipful citizers. McDonald is now in the county jail, charged with forgery and obtaining money under false pretenses. The man came here about three weeks ago with his wife and child. They stopped for a time at the Wilson and made a flashy showing. Later they moved to 315 East Second South street.

The fact that McDonald had been passing worthless checks was discovered by a Commercial street saloon-keeper who claims to have been bunceed out of \$50 on two checks. Next came complaints from Alexander Dunlop a chauffeur.

Dunlop and the Sharman and Wasatch Automobile companies found they had been given bogus checks and the matter was reported to the police.

Detective Eurt got into an automobile and started out to find McDonald. It was learned that he had gone down to the Salt Palace. Upon the arrival of the officer, McDonald jumped into an auto and started up town. Burt followed in his machine and managed to overtake the man at the theater corner.

At the police station McDonald sald At the police station McDonaid said he would "fix things up all right." and did not appear to be worried in the least. In fact his actions there indicated that he regarded his doings in the light of a series of good jokes.

His bail was fixed in the sum of \$250 which his wife is trying to raise. It is said McDonaid's father is a wealthy atternate in Los Appeles. attorney in Los Angeles.

Bell Switchboard Said to be Largest in United States.

There is a slight delay in cutting over from the old to the new switchboards in the new Bell Telephone building, so that it will be done on building, so that it will be done on Saturday. Sept. 28. The capacity of the new board is \$,800 individual lines, which will take care of 15,000 subscribers, and additional panels can be added at any time, as the exigencies of trade demand them. However, the total capacity of the Salt Lake plant is 17,600 lines, or 30,000 subscribers.
