

DAVID B. HILL TALKS POLITICS

Says There is No Longer Any
Democratic Party and
Scores Bryan.

KEY OF COMING CAMPAIGN.

Ex-Leader of New York Democracy
Says It Should Be Taft, the Can-
didate of Political Patronage.

New York, June 11.—David B. Hill, former United States senator and for a long time leader of the Democratic party in this state, called for Europe today on the steamer Baltic. Discussing his retirement from active politics, Mr. Hill said:

"There is no Democratic party. When I met the late Gov. Alford in a little room up a back stairs in a small Chicago

go hotel, shortly before the first so-called Bryan convention, I told him that the policies which he represented would drive the Democratic party to hell. Then, when he begged for another try four years later, I said, 'You are almost there; stop before you have absolutely ruined the party. But Bryan was nominated, as I saw the futility of a minority report, with only 10 votes to back me.

"I admit that the Republican party is badly disorganized at the present time. Both parties are disorganized. There was an opportunity, but I fear that it has been overlooked.

"The key of this political campaign should be, Taft, the candidate of political patronage. What else is he? He is put before the people as a candidate by the power of political patronage. Nothing else.

"Now, both sides in the coming political struggle will have to go to the masses for their votes. They must draw from the masses, and what bet-

ter man could stand against the candidate representing the power of patronage than John Johnson, who spent his boyhood days in a county poorhouse?"

"Think of it! Torchlight processions with banners reading, 'John Johnson, the Poorhouse Candidate.' And from what I have been able to learn, Mr. Johnson is more than a mere near-to-the-people candidate. He is a well-balanced man, and an able man.

"Every time Bryan says 'I kept the faith' it makes me smile. He kept it out in Nebraska, his own state, which is now Republican. He kept it in the Democratic party and says:

"I have kept the faith."

STEINHIL'S MURDER.

Widow Titled Idea That It Was a Political Crime.

Paris, June 11.—Mme. Steinhil, widow of Adolphe Steinhil, the French artist, who, with his mother-in-law, Mrs. Japy, was strangled to death in the city of May, says: "I kept the faith" today relative to the rumors which have been in circulation here to the effect that there was a political motive behind the crime. She manifested great indignation when told it was reported the thieves were not after money, but were seeking certain compromising letters which were confided to her husband by one of the most prominent men in France.

Mme Steinhil replied:

"That is ridiculous. I swear upon the memory of my husband, and nothing is more sacred to me than he never possessed any political documents, and as he was not interested in politics he had nothing to conceal."

EX-CAPT. KELLAR CONVICTED.

Chicago, June 11.—Daniel F. Kellar, former captain in the United States army, was today found guilty in the United States district court of the larceny of six blank checks from the office of the quartermaster at Fort Sheridan, Ill. The defendant was given until June 23 to file a bill of exceptions.

The penalty for the offense of which Kellar was found guilty is a term of from one to five years in the penitentiary, or a fine of \$5,000, or both.

HITCHCOCK OUT ON BAIL.

New York, June 11.—Raymond Hitchcock, the comedian, who was acquitted today by a jury which for several days has been hearing evidence on charges preferred by several young girls and who was remanded to the Tombs prison under other indictments on similar charges, was released from the Tombs this afternoon under \$7,500 bail.

No definite decision as to what course will be taken with reference to the indictments still pending has been reached.

MURDER AND ROBBERY.

Official and Four Assistants Killed.

\$12,000 Secured.

Tiffin, June 11.—Ten robbers, heavily armed, invaded the custom office here today and killed the official in charge and his four assistants, decamping with \$12,000. The police pursued the robbers, killing three of them, but the others escaped.

BAILEY OPERATED ON.

New York, June 11.—That United States Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas, who has been ill with throat trouble in this city for several days, has submitted to a surgical operation on his throat and is now recovering therefrom, became known today. His condition was reported to be favorable, although he was suffering from a slight fever. Senator Bailey was expected to leave his apartment at the Waldorf-Astoria to attend the meeting of the monetary commission, of which he is a member.

CONGRESS OF MOTHERS.

Philadelphia, June 11.—The executive committee of the National Congress of Mothers at a meeting here today decided to hold the next annual convention at New Orleans in February, 1909. It was also decided to hold four national bazars in as many cities for the purpose of raising money to carry on the work of looking after the welfare of children. One bazar will be held in Philadelphia, under the direction of Mrs. William A. Carter; one in Chicago, with Mrs. Louis K. Gollison of that city in charge; one in Denver under the management of Mrs. Henry J. Hershey of Denver, and one in Los Angeles, which will be in charge of Mrs. Jefferson B. Gibbs of Los Angeles. The bazars will be held simultaneously on Dec. 2, 3, and 4.

WRECK IN BELGIUM.

Tournai, Belgium, June 11.—There was a railroad wreck near here today, in which five persons were killed, and several others wounded. A passenger train from Mons ran off the track and several cars were demolished. The wreckage immediately caught fire and was consumed. It was with much difficulty that the wounded were removed from the wreckage before the flames reached them.

PARCEL POST PACKAGES.

Washington, June 11.—In order to increase our commercial relations with Great Britain and Ireland by facilitating the sending of parcel post packages of merchandise to those countries, Postmaster-General Meyer has increased the weight limit to 11 pounds, effective July 1 next. At the present time a package weighing in excess of four pounds six ounces cannot be sent in the mails to the United Kingdom. There are now 33 foreign countries with which we have parcel post conventions; with nine the weight limit is four pounds six ounces, and with 24 it is 11 pounds. It is the intention to make the maximum weight 11 pounds in all instances.

WOMAN SHOT.

Pittsburg, June 11.—Mrs. Margaret Kold, 60 years old, wife of Martin Kold, proprietor of the Highland hotel, was shot through the neck early today and was taken to a hospital in critical condition. Adam Spahn, 38 years old, a partner of the woman's husband, is under arrest. He admits the shooting and said that Mrs. Kold and he had trouble over business affairs. Mr. Kold is visiting in Germany.

KILLED HIS OWN PARTNER.

Reno, Nev., June 11.—A special to this city from Winnemucca says:

Following a dispute over the title to a mining claim, Martin Lorenzo, a prospector, shot and killed Jack Bell, his former partner, near the de Long ranch on Happy creek.

Bell and Lorenzo met in the hills and a dispute ensued. Bell pointed his rifle at Lorenzo, declaring he would shoot, whereupon Lorenzo fired, toppling Bell from his horse. Lorenzo then walked to his prostrate foe, firing two more shots into his body. Sheriff Lamb left for the de Long ranch to arrest Lorenzo.

KILLED IN DRUNKEN BRAWL.

Tacoma, Wash., June 12.—In a drunken brawl last night, near Roy, Wash., Yacobi Lepate, an Indian, 41 years old, was killed by Alexander Parsons, a young Indian roustabout, and Jacques Skidmunk, also an Indian and about 60 years old, was so badly injured he will probably die.

Parsons has been arrested. All three had their homes in the Nisqually reservation.

AMERICANS MAY SLEEP SECURELY

"Fighting Bob" Evans Says So
Because Our Navy, Ship for
Ship, Can Hold Its Own.

BUT MUST HAVE MORE SHIPS

If the Country Desires to be on the
Safe Side—Admiral Favors
A Greater Fleet.

New York, June 11.—Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans, who left for Lake Mohonk today to spend the summer, said much of the criticism of the American navy was unwarranted.

"Americans can go to sleep every night satisfied that ship for ship, they have a navy able to hold its own against any vessels of equal age," said he. "But we must have more ships if we want to keep on the safe side."

"There is not a trace of war anywhere on the horizon," the admiral went on, "but one can never tell. Russia and Japan went at it before declarations were made. The same thing could happen to us. When one is ready and willing to fight, the other fellow usually is not. To be ready is the only way to prevent war."

"A great deal has been said about the defects of our battleships. Most of the staff is not worthy of notice. Our ships have fewer defects than any warships built the same time that ours were. There is not the slightest doubt about that."

Asked his opinion as to the most formidable battleship, the admiral said:

"The ship that is to carry the battery that will win a fight must not be less than 25,000 tons. The 20,000-ton battleship is not big enough."

"Are you still in favor of a greater fleet?" he was asked.

"Indeed, I am," he replied. "We want 24 battleships on each coast."

CONFEDERATE VETERANS.

Birmingham, Ala., June 11.—Several thousand veterans took their place in line today for the crowning event of the annual reunion of the United Confederate veterans. At the head of the line rode Gen. Clement A. Evans, the new commander-in-chief of the organization. With him were the few distinguished confederate generals living, Cabell, Gordon, Walker and the others in the city. Gen. George C. Harrison of Alabama was in command. Sixty thousand persons saw the veterans file through the streets and cheered themselves hoarse.

OLDEST YALE ALUMNUS DEAD.
Providence, R. I., June 11.—William Davis Ely, the oldest alumnus of Yale university and a member of the class of 1836, died at his home here today of heart failure, aged 93 years.

DEATH FROM SUFFOCATION.

Two Children Hide in Large Trunk
With a Spring Lock.

Fall River, Mass., June 11.—After a long search tonight the bodies of Joseph and Andrew Beaudry, 8 and 5 years old, respectively, were found locked in a trunk, in which the children are supposed to have hidden themselves in order to escape going to school this morning. The trunk has a spring lock. The medical examiner decided that their deaths were due to suffocation. The interior of the trunk and the clothing and bodies of the children gave evidence of struggles which the little ones had made to escape before death finally overtook them.

Joseph and Andrew were the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Beaudry, who work in the mills, and the little ones were left in care of their older brother, Wilford, who was supposed to get them ready for school. Wilford is 11 years old. He says that he thought Joseph and Andrew had started for school when he left the house to attend school himself, and knew nothing about their disappearance until he returned home tonight.

TWO LOVERS ELOPE.

The Lochinsvar is Seventy-Nine and
The Young Lady Eighty.

Chicago, June 12.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Madison, Wis., says: Rudolph Ploetz, aged 76, a wealthy widower of the village of Prairie Du Lac, eloped yesterday with Miss Ursula Hungen, aged 80, his sweetheart of childhood days.

Unknown to his sons, who are bitterly opposed to his marriage, the aged bridegroom and his bride slipped into Madison and were married by a justice of the peace.

The system of espionage on the old man established by the sons had lived to prevent him carrying out his desire. The couple were sweethearts in youth and had parted over a petty quarrel. Miss Hungen had never married, waiting a lifetime for her first love.

MEXICAN SOLDIERS PURSUING YAQUIS

Tucson, Ariz., June 12.—A special from Hermosillo, Mexico, says 4,000 Mexican soldiers under the personal command of Gen. Lorenzo Torres are in the country in hot pursuit of the Yaqui Indians.

All negotiations looking toward the signing of the peace treaty were suddenly broken off this afternoon. The Yaquis insisted on retaining their arms and ammunition, after having acceded to every other stipulation of the Mexican government.

The Mexican officers stood steadfast and the Yaquis withdrew from the conference. Immediately orders were dispatched to the Mexican troops in the field to resume hostilities. It is not believed that the campaign will last long, as the Mexican troops have all the water holes in the Yaqui country surrounded.

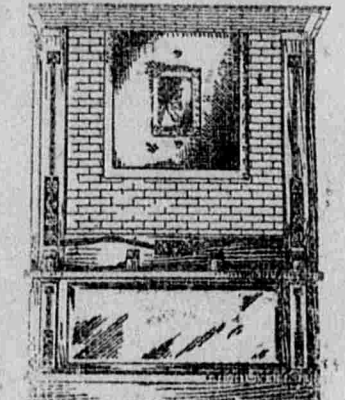

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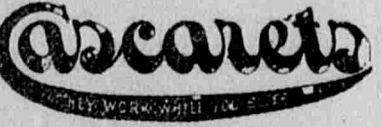
