

RABBI FREUND'S FIRST SERMON.

Eloquent Discourse Delivered Before the Congregation of B'Nai Israel.

CHANNECOAH CELEBRATION.

Fest of Lights Made the Occasion For Initial Address by the Jewish Leader.

Last night at the celebration of Channecoah—the feast of lights—the congregation of B'Nai Israel listened to the first sermon of Rabbi Charles Freund, who has just come to take charge of the congregation. The sermon was an eloquent one, and was listened to with great attention. At its close many of the congregation remained to meet their new rabbi.

He said in part: "Over 2,000 years ago the temple in Jerusalem was dedicated. The destruction of a hostile foe were removed and in their place the pure worship of God was reinstated. To accomplish this desired result was no easy task. A strong enemy had temporarily succeeded in discomfiting the Jewish worship. Led on by the valiant band of Holofernes the Syrians were in the course of a few years driven forth. The temple service, which had been interrupted, was again resumed. We see the priests seeking for the oil, pure and undefiled, which had not been desecrated at the hands of the hostile Holofernes."

THE MIRACLE OF THE FEAST. "Legend informs us that only one little cruse of consecrated oil was found, and by a miracle it lasted during the eight days of dedicatory service. We light again and we see the high priest lighting the eternal lamp once more to keep it lit until the day when the sacrificial service came to its end. And as we review the pages of Jewish history, we listen to the voices of trained Levite choirs who, to the accompaniment of instruments of brass and string lend added splendor to the service."

"Above the din of the burning, smoking sacrifices, more distinct than the musical instruments, we distinguish the words of the joyful song. And truly they have occasion for song and rejoicing for had not the people, a mere handful of God-fearing men, against the trained and more numerous troops of the enemy succeeded in driving out their persecutors? The song of triumph is not without its self-praise, but a keen and proper recognition that one other than human helps to shape their destiny. We do not mark, as we do in the story of the Jews, the day which God has made. Let us rejoice and be glad on it."

"It is a telling sentence from the ever-applicable collection of the songs composed by the sweet singer of Israel. Their grand universality sees them ready for use on all occasions of life. In joy or sorrow, in gladness or affliction, on the occasion of ordinary or otherwise, the psalm can readily be applied. And it is not to be wondered at if Judah and his brothers and all the people joined in the joyful singing that this was an especial day when God has made, let us rejoice and be glad on it."

SURVIVAL OF JEWISH WORSHIP. "Greece and Rome have passed away. Babylon and Assyria are no more. But in recent times with special reverence by fame-seeking archaeologists, Judea also has, as a land of active importance, long since ceased to play a part in universal history. Not so, however, with its after-time inhabitants who cherish the religion which rested in its sacred soil. Among the practices which have survived the buffets which the Jew received since he left his erstwhile original home, is this, as present feast of the Channecoah, which we begin to celebrate this evening."

"We call it a survival. Rightly so! That one Jew has survived to greet the dawn of this day of grace is to be accounted more of a miracle than the continuous burning of the cruse of oil as told in the legend which partially explains the origin of the celebration of this feast of lights. The stained and darkened pages of history tell their awful tale. We thank God that His providence watched over and guided His people, so that in their unhindered worship they could ever see and recognize His guiding hand. Then may we also exult with the psalter: 'This is the day which God has made. Let us rejoice and be glad on it.'"

THE DAY DOUBLY SIGNIFICANT. "This day has a double significance for all of us here assembled. It is the day marking the commencement of the commemorative season of the hard-earned victory of the Maccabees and their hands of faithful followers. We certainly honor their memories as we annually recall their glorious deeds. Not that we glory so much in the blood that they spilled so much as in the spirit that they manifested to brook no interference with their divine worship. It were well indeed if men of modern times could be as readily imbued with the idea that nothing should hinder their sincere worship."

"As a result of their fervent ardor they succeeded in rededicating their temple on this 25th day of Kislev. And as you and I stand together on this self-same day we go through a ceremony of dedication. For we are dedicating our lives collectively and individually to a cause akin to that for which our ancestors, known and un-

known, have lived and died. The cause of our religion has had its valiant heroes as brave as any who have sacrificed their lives in behalf of country. And to the continuation of this, our Judaism, you a congregation in Israel, priding yourselves in your name 'B'Nai Israel', and I, a follower and seeker after truth, do on this day dedicate our lives and efforts to preserve its name and fame unsullied. Verily may we exclaim with Israel's far-famed psalmist, 'This is the day which God has made; let us rejoice and be glad on it.'"

In closing Rabbi Freund delivered the following eloquent exhortation: "So let us work together, understanding each other's aims, striving to attain to some noble heights. And as we go hand in hand overcoming difficulties that may beset our paths may there be true harmony in this house and home of B'Nai Israel. And in our consecrating service of dedication let us kindle and rekindle our holy lamp with the burning fervor to benefit mankind; with kindled taper let us infuse new life to dedicate this day to the cause of our religion and of humanity; and, as I would assume the sacred trust you repose in me may it fall to my lot to do well in the furtherance of all of our combined noble work. All of our lives, with united efforts, strive to do our allotted tasks with willing hearts, and as we achieve success may we ever remember that we are parts of the great ordered universe, which sing in chorus the praises of Him who said the word and the world came into being."

BIG DAMAGES.

Lucin Cut-off Explosion Makes Southern Pacific Defendant for \$301,400.

The Southern Pacific Railroad company was yesterday made defendant in the biggest suit for personal damages yet filed as the result of the explosion of a car of dynamite at the Lucin cut-off last spring. The suits, which were filed yesterday afternoon in the United States federal court, are those of the station telegraph operator, Mrs. Edna E. Taylor, and her husband, William A. Taylor, who was residing in the station house but not in the employment of the company.

The two suits asked for a total of \$301,400 in payment for personal disfigurement and injuries as the result of having a car of dynamite explode in front of the station and set it on fire. Mrs. Taylor alleges that since the disaster she has been unable to obtain employment as a telegraph operator owing to injuries to her eyes. She asks for \$100,000 in payment for her injuries. Mr. Taylor, who claims to have been severely hurt about the head and limbs, asks for \$201,400. If the suits follow the usual line of procedure they will be settled out of court by stipulation for about \$1,000 cash.

MUST PAY ALIMONY.

Supreme Court Holds Mrs. Read Entitled to \$70 a Month.

In the case of Lila Read against Charles Read, appellant, the supreme court has handed down an opinion affirming the judgment of the lower court. Mrs. Read was granted a divorce from appellant and was awarded \$70 per month alimony. The appeal was taken from the order awarding alimony, appellant claiming that the amount was excessive. Justice McCarty, who wrote the opinion of the court, holds that the amount is liberal, but not excessive in view of the fact that Mr. Read earns from \$250 to \$300 per month, and owns a home valued at \$16,000.
