BOY KILLED BY ELECTRICITY Shocking Affair Due to Touching a Live

Wire. Special Correspondence.

Sunshine, Toosle Co., March 16 .- A shocking and fatal accident occurred here March 4. Moster Harvey Averett aged 12 years and two days, was in-stantly killed by touching a "live" whe at the "Overland" mill here. The lit-tle fellow went to the works to carry his uncle's lunch and while returning home he unwittingly touched the wire, which lay near the ground, and met in-stant death. The lad with a brother and sister were living with their grand-mother, Mrs. R. Biddlecome, the post-master here, the childrens' mother heling dead. A strange coincidence in the family was the death two years ago of a little daughter, aged 5 years and 2 days she being killed by a streetcar. The boy was burled at Grantsville be-side his mother.
