

Grand Jury Elicits Confirmation Of Certain Facts Tending To Complete Evidence.

TACTICS OF RUEF'S ATTYS.

Suddenly Changed, the Fight Now Being for Privilege of Going to Trial at Once.

San Francisco, March 26 .- The grand jury investigation of bribery and graft in San Francisco resulted in the finding of no new indictments today. But one session was held, lasting from 2 o'clock until 5. At its conclusion Dist. Atty. Langdon sald:

"No new lines of information were opened up by today's investigation, but from the witnesses examined we elicitad confirmation of certain facts tending to connect some links in the chain of evidence showing bribery of San Francisco officials by the Home Telephone company.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Hency said:

"We went over new ground today, but purely for the purpose of clinching evidence already adduced.

dence already adduced." The witnesses examined before the grand jury at this afternoon's session were John M. C. Marble, a retired bank-er of Los Angeles, formerly president and now a director of the Home Tele-phone company of that city; Jonn Van Lien of Oakland, connected with the Empire Construction company of Cali-fornia, the corporation said to have been organized by the telephone com-pany to handle the getting of the local franchises in whose obtaining the latter concern is charged with having spent approximately 3300,600 in bribes in addi-tion to the \$25,000 paid to the city and the \$75,000 paid into the earthquake-fire relief fund. L. G. Burpes, vice presi-dent of the First National bank of Oakland; Nicholas Prendersast of Los Angeles, one of the original promoters of the Home Telephone company of the Centrni bank of Oakland, and Miss Nellie Smith, stenographer to the first Nellie Smith, stenographer to the first of San Francisco. Washington, March 26 .- That Senator Foraker does not concede that Secy. Taft will be Ohlo's endce for the presidential nomination is made plain by a statement issued by the senator tonight Senator Foraker says that he "does not want any political honors from the peo-; le without their hearty approval," and he suggests that "the proper way to determine who is the choice of the people to head the Republican national ticket and to represent the state in t... United States senate is for the Republicar state executive committee to au

thorize a primary election to choose delegates to the state convention which will be called upon to determine these questions.' The announcement of State Supt. of

The announcement of State Supt. of Insurance Arthur I. Vores that he will support Secy. Taft for the presidential nomination led Senator Foraker, it is believed, to issue the statement out-lining his position. The senator de-clares he is willing to go before the people on his record, and that he has "nothing to conceal from his constitu-ents." nts." Mr. Foraker does not say that he will President

Mr. Foraker does not say that he will be a candidate to aucceed President Roosevelt, but it is generally under-stood among his friends in Wash-ington that at a later date he will formally announce his candidacy and that if the primary election is called in Ohio he will enter the fight to secure the endorsement of his own state. Senator Foraker, in his statement,

says: "I have been so busily occupied that I have neither had time nor disposition to even think about politics, either state or national, and especially politics that belong to next year. "It seems to me premature to be now discussing what is so far ahead. How-

ever, in view of the interviews and an-nouncements appearing in the news, I feel 1 may with propriety say I do not want any political honors from the Re-publicans of Ohio without their hearty approval.

approval. "In order that there may be no doubt as to their preferences, I shall as the proper time request the Republican state central committee to issue a call for a Republican state convention to be composed of delegates elected by the Republicans of the state at duly au-breised advector elections for the pub-

Republicans of the state at duly au-thorized primary elections, for the pur-pose not only of noninating candidates for state offices to be voted for at our next state election, but also to deter-mine the preference of the Republicans of Ohio as to candidates for United States senator and president.

States senator and president. "If this suggestion should meet with favor, it should be provided that the primary elections shall be held at a convenient time long enough after the call has been issued to enable all who are interested in the work of the con-vention to appear before the people and discuss the public questions involved, so that the people may act intelligently in that the people may act intelligently in the selection of their delegates, thus bringing this selection as nearly to a direct popular vote as is possible under the laws now in force.

"I have no opinions to conceal from my constituents, and there is no point in my public record as to which I am not ready to render them a full ac-

count.

THE JAPANESE

LAW ON MATTER IS DRASTIC.

Officials Are Instructed That They Must Show Courtesy and Considcration Towards Them.

Washington, March 26 .- Secy. Straus

of the department of commerce and labor today issued a number of regulations relating to the coming of Japanese and Korean laborers to the continental territory of the United States. They follow:

"Allens from Japan and Korea are subject to the general immigration laws.

"Every Japanese dr Korean laborer skilled or unskilled, applying for admission at a seaport or at a land border port of the United States, and have ing in his possession a passport issued by the government of Japan, entitling him to proceed only to Mexico, Canada or Hawaii, shall be refused admission.

"If a Japanese or Korean laborer ap-If a Japanese of Avrean horizonta applies for admission and presents no passport it shall be presumed that he did not possess when he departed from Japan or Korea a passport entitling him to come to the United States, and that he did possess at that time a pass-pert limited to Mexico, Canada or Hawaii.

'If a Japanese or Korean allen applies for admission and presents a pass-port entitling him to enter the United states or one which is not limited to Mexico, Canada or Hawali, he shall be admitted if it appears that he does not belong to any of the classes of aliens excluded by the general immi-

aliens excluded by the general infini-gration laws. "If a Japanese or Korean alien ap-plies for admission and presents a pass-port limited to Mexico, Canada or Hawaii, and claims he is not a laborer, either skilled or unskilled, reasonable proof of this claim shall of required in order to particly him to aptor

proof of this claim shall de required in order to permit him to enter. "When a Japanese or Korean allen is rejected as being a skilled or unskilled laborer holding a passport limited to Mexico, Canada or Hawaii, he shall be allowed the right of appeal to the sec-retary of commerce and labor und the same conditions as attach to alle... ejected under the general immigration

"If a Japanese or Korean skilled or "If a Japanese or Korean skilled or unskilled laborer is found in the cou-tinental territory of the United States without having been duly admitted, up-on inspection the procedure employed under the general immigration laws for the arrest and hearing of allens who have entered the United States surrep-titiously shall be observed to the end that the right of such allen to remain in the United States may be deter-mined; and if it shall-appear that such allen has entered the United States mined; and if it shall appear that such alien has entered the United States since the 14th of March, 1907, the said alien shall be deported according to the provisions of sections 20, 21, and 25 of the act of Congress approved March 3, 1903, and after July 1, 1967, according to the provisions of the like numbered sections of the act of Congress ap-proved Feb. 20, 1207.
