

THOSE NAMED FOR REPRESENTATIVES.

County Convention Nominates Ten Candidates for the Lower House.

SIXTEEN NAMES PRESENTED.

Unanimity of William L. Dunn's Friends Lost Him the Nomination—Party Emblem.

LEGISLATIVE TICKET.

For State Senators—Stephen H. Love, Samuel Park, George N. Lawrence.

The Republican county legislative convention was completed yesterday afternoon by the nomination of 10 candidates for membership in the lower house, when the "News" report closed Chairman Erick had just placed in nomination William M. McCrea and Herbert H. Cramer. Then followed the names of others in rapid succession, William Dunn being nominated by Parley Christensen, Harry S. Joseph by William A. Lee, C. E. Marks by O. W. McAllister, Cleason S. Kinney by James H. Hammond, Thomas Hull by Fredrick T. H. Griffiths by A. S. Reiser, S. Stokely by D. O. Hildesut, William McAllister by H. E. Booth, Fred G. Palmer by R. G. Schuller, A. V. Anderson by J. W. Smith, William J. Panter by Pat Dixon, S. A. Kenner by George H. Reiser and R. H. McDonald by H. C. Edwards.

RESULT OF THE BALLOT.

When nominations had closed the convention proceeded to a ballot but it was two hours later before the vote was finally announced. This showed the following result, the 10 receiving the largest number of votes being declared nominated:

William McCrea, 379; W. T. Edwards, 378; S. J. Stokely, 366; A. V. Anderson, 365; H. B. Crocker, 347; Thomas Hull, 346; C. E. Marks, 308; S. J. Stokely, 299; William Panter, 289; C. S. Kinney, 288.

FRIENDS DEFEATED HIM.

It may be said for Mr. Dunn that the unanimity of his friends lost him the nomination. When he had received a majority of the votes in the convention a total of 199, they advised him to switch to another candidate in the hope of electing him as a nomination. This worked very well for the party as he was successful in securing the nomination, but for Mr. Dunn it proved disastrous as he fell far behind the other 10, losing what he had practically conceded to him from the start. In some respects it was a serious set, but it was far from being a defeat.

COUNTY EMBLEM.

Before adjournment the convention authorized the county committee to fill any vacancies that might occur on the ticket, and adopted as the county emblem, the same as that adopted by the fair convention.

WALL PUTS UP BOND.

Work of Paving East South Temple Can Now Proceed.

There is nothing now to interfere with commencement of the paving of East South Temple street from State to Smith East street. The bond of \$50,000, which the council required of the property owners to indemnify the city in the event that some dissatisfied citizen should sue for damages because of the change in the grade of the street, has been furnished by Col. E. A. Wall personally. The Utah Savings & Trust company is the surety and the bond is now in the hands of the city clerk.
