**LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**

**The Second Term.**—The second term of the present academic year of the B. Y. Academy, commenced this morning.

**Immigrants.**—We learn by telegram to Prest. Taylor that the company in charge of Elder Wm. Bramall were 400 miles east of Ogden at 11 o'clock this morning. They may be expected to arrive in this city to-morrow evening.

**Newly Appointed.**—Mr. Joseph L. Heywood, a young gentleman of this city, has been appointed express messenger on the Utah Southern Extension, from Juab to Deseret. He assumed his new duties this morning.

**From Georgia.**—Elder Rudger Clawson returned home Saturday evening, from Dalton, Georgia, whither he went about a month ago, to attend the trial of the murderers of Elder Standing. The readers of the NEWS are already acquainted with the results of the trial. President John Morgan will remain in his field of labor for the present.

**To New York.**—Professor Joseph J. Daynes, one of Salt Lake's leading instrumentalists, and for years the organist of the Tabernacle Choir, takes his departure for the eastern metropolis to-morrow morning. He will remain away long enough to perfect his already advanced musical training; it may be two years or less time. We wish Brother Daynes all success in his studies and labor, and hope to see him return in due time, that his native community may enjoy as heretofore, the results of the talent with which he is so eminently gifted.

**Tabernacle Services.**—Yesterday afternoon the congregation at the Tabernacle was addressed by Elder George Teasdale. The audience was unusually large and very attentive. The speaker began by quoting a number of sayings of the Savior, showing the necessity of self-denial on the part of those who look up the cross to follow Him. It was not only necessary to believe the Gospel, but it was imperative that its principles be practiced. The teachings of the Son of God all indicated this lesson, though the doctrines of men in this age were often in direct contradiction to them. The same gospel expounded by Jesus Christ was revealed to Joseph Smith and taught by him as long as he remained on the earth, before he laid down his life, like his great Master, for the sake of the principles he enunciated. Joseph was called an impostor, but if he were one, he was surely one of the most extraordinary personages that ever appeared in the religious world. His enemies would not acknowledge this. They called him ignorant, indolent and stupid, and yet clothed him with power and importance superior to the most able and intelligent men of his time. The fact was plain that if he were an impostor, he did more than any other impostor that ever lived. It was easy enough to cry "false Prophet," the Scribes and Pharisees so called the Son of God, but their assertions did not prove their own truth then, any more than similar assertions do now. The speaker then adverted to the first principles of the Gospel, explaining their meaning and importance, and the necessity of being led by direct revelation from God, the privilege of all who embraced the Gospel and lived up to its requirements. The promise was to all, to ask and receive, and those who heard this Gospel preached and did not receive it were left without excuse, because if they heard it and lacked wisdom regarding its meaning, they had but to ask of God who gives to all men liberally. But few ever thought of this. Instead of asking information of the Almighty regarding these things when they came to their ears, they shut up their minds against them, allowed themselves to become prejudiced against the servants of God, and even persecuted and put them to death. The gospel in its purity never was popular. Its advocates and disciples were always persecuted and despised, according to the Savior's prediction concerning all who should live good lives. One of the principles of the Gospel, as taught by the Saints of today was celestial marriage; plurality of wives. The world thought this was a terribly demoralizing principle, debasing to man and degrading to woman, and overlooking the vices existing in their own midst, in order to criticize "Mormonism," a system so much superior to their own that it would not admit of a comparison.

The speaker bore his testimony to the truth of the gospel, as he had proven it always, when living up to its principles. The world did not understand the motives and acts of the Saints now, but would eventually. It was believed, generally, that belief in Christ was all-sufficient for salvation, because Paul said "ye are saved by grace." But Paul did not say that to the world of to-day. He said it to the Saints of Rome and Ephesus, who not only believed, but practiced the true gospel. And all who were "saved by grace" to-day, would find that they must work out their salvation, as did the Saints anciently, and as all men will have to do, as long as the earth stands.

The choir then sang an anthem. For Child Beating.—The man and woman arrested for beating a little child, were arraigned before Justice Pyper this morning. The man pleaded not guilty, and as it was evident that he had not been a party to the offense, he was discharged. The woman, however, having whipped the child, but in extenuation plead her inexperience and thoughtlessness. She was fined \$20 and costs, with the condition that the child remained where it was, at the house of the lady who made the complaint to the police.

**He Refutes It.**—An individual signing himself Le Roy Pratt, representing the Universal Copying Company of San Francisco, writes from Portage, Box Elder County, under date of the 31st ult., in refutation of a communication that appeared in the NEWS recently signed R. F. S., asserting that he (Pratt) had been "bribed" by the people of Bear Lake, by delivering "colored photographs" for "dark ink and water color portraits." This the latter indignantly denies, in language more emphatic than elegant. We notice his communication at his request.

**Recovering from Paralysis.**—We are pleased to state that Bishop W. Ringhurst, of Springville, the victim of a stroke of paralysis several weeks ago, was so far recovered last week as to be able to walk a distance of two blocks. His right side is somewhat numb and he is forced to drag his limb a little, while going, but his memory is not impaired in the least.

**The Hutchinsons.**—The Hutchinson Family, of New England Vermont, who visited this city last winter, are again among us. They finished the music at the Methodist Church, last evening, and held a grand vocal concert in the same building to-night. See their advertisement.

**The West.**—The 17th Ward has a most market. The new structure was put up last week, and stands on the corner west of the north-west corner of the Temple Block.

**Diphtheria.**—This dreadful complaint still clings to the community. Three new cases are reported in the family of Elder Robert Patrick, 18th Ward.

**Coming Home.**—Mr. E. W. Sears, who has been absent in Europe on business for several months, is on his way home, and will probably arrive on Wednesday or Thursday. Elder W. C. Staines is expected from New York at the same time. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dye will arrive to-morrow from their visit to Great Britain.

**Funeral Services.**—The funeral of the child of Elder George Reynolds was held at the family residence in the 20th Ward, yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. Among those present were Elders Angus M. Cannon, George Teasdale and Joseph E. Taylor, who addressed the meeting consecutively, and Elder Fearmon Little, who pronounced the benediction. Bishop John Sharp directed the services.

**Killed by a Fall.**—Saturday afternoon, a most shocking accident occurred in the 7th Ward, which has since proved fatal to its victim, a little son of Robert Condie, between two and three years old. The child had been put up in the loft of the barn, to play on the hay with some other children and by some mischance fell therefrom, a distance of 20 feet, striking his head first upon an inverted bake-kettle, one of the iron legs of which entered the skull and inflicted a deep and dangerous wound. Dr. Hamilton was summoned and found it necessary to remove a portion of the skull, from which the brains were coming. His little hope was entertained of the child's recovery, and it occasioned more sorrow than surprise, therefore, when last night, about 10 o'clock, the little victim breathed its last. We deeply sympathize with the afflicted parents in their bereavement.

The conference was addressed Saturday morning by Elder Lorenzo Snow and President Taylor; in the afternoon by Elders Orson Pratt and C. W. Penrose. Sunday morning by Elder George Q. Cannon and Bishop L. W. Hardy, in the afternoon by Bishop E. F. Sheets, F. D. Richards and President Taylor. The meetings were well attended and an excellent spirit prevailed. The brethren held meetings last night and expected to hold some to-night in the settlements adjacent to Logan. Cache Valley is having a spiritual feast.
