

## COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Violators of the Game Law Still Being Prosecuted.

## A LIST OF SMALL OFFENDERS.

Commissioner Somers' Arrest—A Fighting Sherman—New Wells Filed—General Items.

This was naturalization day again in the Third district court, Judge Merritt's time being taken up mostly to the examination of aliens who applied for citizenship. After the usual examination, a goodly number of newly-eligible citizens received their papers and became eligible for the work of the republic.

Orders in civil actions were entered as follows:

*Robert vs. Roberts*, order to show cause continuing November 9, unless another date fixed by Judge Hatch, who is at present in Europe.

*Hugh H. Bohannon et al. v. J. Markham et al.* hearing in progress.

*Sixty-1, Goss*, inclined to grant attorney's motion to quash today his arraignment before Judge Hatch.

*Miss Susan J. Rawlings* obtained a divorce from her husband, mining engineer J. B. Rawlings, after a long stay in the granite country and failure to private. She was awarded \$50 per month permanent alimony, with \$500 suit money and an attorney's fee.

The Atlantic National Bank, of Atlantic, Kansas, by its attorney, Nathan Ferguson, had sued in the Salt Lake court that same against F. L. Parker, and had filed a bill of \$100,000, including interest, for 199.85 percent, and more of this. The basis of the action is a promissory note given by defendant to a Mrs. Ferguson.

Another step has been taken in the long contested Franklin-Saint-Germain dispute. L. M. Gilliland, an attorney for the St. J. J. Saint-Germain estate, filed a complaint in which he says that M. L. Gilliland is required to deed to him a half interest in the Vinton mining claim, in Tooele county.

Justice Harvey's court is examining the investigation into the charge of grand larceny against Ave Hunter, accused of stealing a wagon belonging to Charles Cummings, residing in Mt. St. John, being acquitted of the charge.

A warrant was issued for the arrest of Mr. W. O. Polson, who was giving the name of a young man giving the name of G. O. Polson. He ran in on complaint of one Smith, who accused him of shooting ducks at an earlier hour than the hour before hunting. The charge was dismissed, and U. S. Commissioner Greenwald fined him \$2 and costs—\$5 in all.

Then the patrol wagon arrived, the outcome being that Hogan was tumbled into it, and will have to answer to Police Justice Smith on assault charges of assault on an officer.

John Hubert runs a show on East Temple street, just south of the Gothic-Pitts corner. He should have been in U. S. Commissioner Somers' court this morning, on a charge of assaulting E. Johnson, who is a member of the 4th Ward. The trouble was because Johnson wanted \$2.50 wages belonging himself and partner for performing as musicians or Hubert's show. While Johnson was to be paid, Hubert gave him a kick, throwing him down against an obstruction which broke Johnson's nose and caused the glass to cut his face.
