CONVICTS ESCAPE.

South McAlester, I. T., Oct. 12.-Lo-cal officers were notified today of the escape of 15 negroes, inmates of the escape of 15 negroes, inmates of the Arkansas state penitentiary, from a camp in the Boston mountains yes-terday. The convicts are thought to be headed for the southwest. Special deputies will be sworn in and authori-ties of all cities in the south and east-ern part of Indian territory will co-operate in capturing the fugitives. The negroes were working in a gauge

Several members of the band are thought to be armed. A McAlester officer declares there are between 50 and 60 negro convicts from the Arkansas prison at large in the territory. the territory.

contest." ILLUMINATED MANUSCRIPTS.

Morgan's Collection on Exhibition at Columbia University.

Columbia University. New York, Oct. 13.—A large number of people viewed the J. Pierpont Mor-gan collection of illuminated manu-scripts which was exhibited at Colum-bia university yesterday for the first time. The manuscripts represented some of the rarget specimens of art in the middle ages. There are 62 volumes in all, representing nearly every coun-try in Europe and all of them are from 200 to 1,200 years old. The oldest are samples of the Chris-tian art of the eighth century. One of them, a Life of Christ, contains 30 full page miniatures in brilliant coloring, in which gold predominates. The speci-mens of English painting contain a bes-tiary of the year 1150, with 100 minia-tures of birds and beasts.

WOMAN LEADS BURGLARS.
