BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

An appeal has been made to the American board of foreign missions for aid to the Ohio sufferers.

Col. Pitkin is to have the Mexican mission, but his nomination is withheld on account of the dead lock.

The floods in Hungary are increasing; the waters soaked and undermined the dykes, which are giving way.

At Springfield, Mass., on Tuesday, Charles A. Briggs, aged 21, shot Chas. Stetson, dead, during a dance at Pelham.

The taking of testimony in behalf of Mrs. Christianity, in the divorce suit, commenced at Washington yesterday.

Gov. Ordway, of Dakota, has asked the government to help the people of his Territory, left destitute by floods.

Base ball players have organized an eastern championship association, with W. W. White, of Washington, President.

There is a heavy snowstorm in Pennsylvania. Forest fires are raging and snow has been falling since six o'clock.

Peck intimated to-day that the democrats would all go home and leave the Senate without a quorum before long.

The number of killed in all the villages in the southern half of the Island of Ohio, is estimated not to exceed 1,000.

Ex-Congressman Price has arrived at Washington, and will immediately take charge of the affairs of the Indian office.

A post mortem examination revealed the fact that Hattie Deuel had not a drop of blood in her body, which weighed 45 pounds.

Gov. Ordway, of Dakota, has given instructions to draw upon him personally, if necessary, to relieve immediate suffering.

The Berlin police have forbidden, under the socialist law, the holding of the meeting which Herr Bebel was to address at Munich.

J. H. Payne, of Wisconsin, has been appointed chief clerk of the Department of Agriculture to succeed Gen. Carmen Nelives.

Gen. Haupt, new manager of the Northern Pacific, will give a division superintendency to Frank H. Forbes, of the Boston Traveller.

D. Downey and M. Broderick were killed by a cartridge explosion at Poughkeepsie, N.Y., on Tuesday. John Murray was severely injured.

The Pennsylvania House refused to pass the bill approving the President's appointments and asking Pennsylvania's Senators to vote for them.

Stablemen of the West Division Railroad, Chicago, struck for 20 per cent. advance and got it. Citizens are agitating a "no seat, no fare" movement.

The investment of St. Petersburg by a chain of guards has been abandoned as more irksome to loyal persons than efficacious against the nihilists.

This morning, Milmer Schelboz & Co's furniture manufactory at Wheeling, is burned. It was fully stocked, and is a total loss of \$80,000; insurance, \$16,000.

The water is receding at Omaha and ground is reappearing. The damage to the corporation is over \$50,000. The Union Pacific shops start again to-morrow.

Haverley's Mastodon Minstrels and others extinguished a fire on the steamer *Erastus Corning*, for New Haven, last night. The steamer was considerably damaged.

The Havana court martial has completed the trial of the cases of fraud in the marine department. The principal defrauder is condemned to 18 years' imprisonment.

A violent shock of earthquake, lasting four seconds and increasing gradually in strength, passed over the island of Ohio to-day, followed by falling houses on all sides.

The Bey of Tunis sends a protest against French violation of Tunisian territory, and ask the co-operation of Russia in protecting the rights of the Bey and Sublime Porte.
