

**LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**

**The Immigrants.**—A telegram from Elder John Nicholson to President John Taylor, dated yesterday at Grand Island, states that the immigrant company would leave that place by the 8 o'clock evening special and that they expected to reach Ogden Wednesday (to-morrow) night.

**In Town.**—"Staxey," whose other name is Hon. J. C. Rich, of Paris, Bear Lake County, now one of the editors of the *Democrat*, is spending a day or two in the city. He says he means to make the *Democrat* go, pay or no pay. We hope the people of the North will see that the paper is made as good a financial, as it is a journalistic success.

**Treating Cancers.**—Dr. John Higgs, an old resident of Provo, is in the city and will remain here for some time. He makes a specialty of treating cancers and is at present attending to a number of such cases in this community. Those similarly afflicted would do well to see Dr. Higgs. He is at present living at the residence of Brother Henry Emery, 15th Ward.

**Returning Missionaries.**—A letter to President John Taylor from President Wm. Budge, of the European mission, dated October 23d, which we have been permitted to read, speaks in terms of the high praise of the labors of the missionaries who left Liverpool that day for their homes in Utah. Some were permitted to return rather soon from their missions, on account of ill health and other reasons, but all were released cheerfully and have been faithful and industrious in the work. Including returning elders, the company numbers 258 souls. The names will be found in another column.

**Utah Eastern Notes.**—From a gentleman just in from the Park, we learn the following items concerning the Utah Eastern. The ties on the railroad all bedded, the bridges are built, and the iron is in the yard at Ogden. The rolling stock is on hand, the engine works well, and over one mile of iron per day is being laid. The prospects are good that the road will be finished to Kaysville within 10 or 12 days. Six tracks are made to the coal mines. The famous Spriggs mine, belonging to the company, is in excellent condition, and doing a large business under the skillful management of Mr. Hay. Everything is encouraging. Now come forward with your help, friends, and another month will lower the price of coal in Salt Lake City.

**An Unpleasantness.**—We have received a communication from a prominent gentleman of this city, relative to an unpleasant circumstance that took place at the concert in the Assembly Hall last evening. The gentleman and his wife entered the hall, sometime previous to the beginning of the entertainment, and were shown by the usher to their seats, they having procured reserved tickets, though there were no numbers on either the seats or the tickets. They had just got comfortably placed, when along came the usher with a party of new comers and crowded them into the same bench, which being unable to accommodate so many made it so uncomfortable that they mentioned being obliged to leave their seats and move to another part of the house. The gentleman, being afflicted with lameness, did not feel like moving from his position on the end of the form, which he had chosen on account of his lame limb, but eventually resigned his seat and joined his wife. He does not feel in the best of humor over the matter, and we cannot say that we blame him. Those who arrange entertainments for the public should provide against such things, and the ushers themselves should use judgment and discretion in carrying out their duties.

**The Bingham Fire.**—Further news respecting the Bingham fire, mentioned in last evening's News, state that the flames broke out in the rear of a building occupied by Mr. Murphy, and swept down the canyon, carried along by a heavy wind. **On the Way.**—Brother W. N. Fife, of Ogden, is in town with an outfit for traveling, and is on his way to the south-east part of Arizona, near the line of New Mexico, where he is going to settle in company with others. He is well fixed for the trip, is in fine spirits, and anticipates pleasure in the change of location. Brother Fife is one of the old residents of Ogden, a good mechanic, was a fine officer while in the service of the City, and will make a splendid pioneer. Success.

**Last Night's Concert.**—The Assembly Hall was filled last evening, and the grand concert, given by Zion's Musical Society, and the entertainment, as an entirety, fully deserved the liberal patronage it received. The programme was nicely arranged, and although made a little too long by the encores, was a genuine treat, and as such was highly appreciated, as the excellent order maintained throughout, broken only at intervals by warm bursts of applause, gave gratifying evidence. The organ, yet unfinished, at the west end of the Hall, was splendidly draped with the stars and stripes, and all the interior, with the exception of the chair seats and stands used by the performers, were occupied by the public.

**The Overture by the Theatre orchestra,** which commenced the concert, was well rendered and well received. The Madrigal, "Blow, blow, thou wintry wind," though a difficult piece to execute, was ably given by Zion's Musical Society, who occupied the seats immediately in front of the organ, thus being a temporary platform in front of the stands for the orchestra and singers of solos, duets, etc.

**The duet by Miss Horne and Mr. Gardner** was sweetly sung, as was the song by Miss Sheets, which followed. This lady has a voice which, with proper training, will yet be considered very fine. She has not yet learned to use it to the best advantage. The organ solo "Overture to William Tell," was a splendid execution. Mr. Daynes never played better and his finished and artistic performance well merited the encore he received.

**Mr. Foster struck a popular chord** with the song "Bring back the Old Folks" and had a recall. The Union Glee Club next rendered the glee "Come, rise with the Lark," which pleased, and they responded to the applause by another of their selections. A solo from "Judas Maccabean" was next rendered by Mr. W. L. Owen in good style, assisted by the Society. Part second was opened by the orchestra in a nice selection, which preceded a glee entitled "Jack and Jill" by the Society, which took exceedingly well. This was followed by the Cavatina "Tempest of the Heart," from "El Trovatore," a piece which Mr. Gardner, the singer, could hardly do justice to. Something simpler would have been more successful. Miss Nebeker sang "Coming," and was encored, when she rendered Sullivan's popular ballad "Is this a Dream." The latter was the more pleasing. Mr. Weihe's violin solo with piano accompaniment by Mr. Daynes, was brilliant and artistic. He displays fine tone and remarkable execution for one so young. His fantasia obtained a call for an encore, which was given with similar taste and excellence. The quintette from the "Sorcerer" took well, and had to be repeated. Professor Daynes then gave a piano solo, which, though finely rendered and well received, did not begin to touch the popular ear like the main feature of the evening—his organ solo. Skilled musicians could appreciate it. Mr. McCallister, the favorite tenor, sang the cavatina from "Lucia" in good style, but the audience was too tired to fully appreciate it. He was unfortunate in being placed so near the foot of the programme, which was not only rather long, but had been extended by repetitions. The duet and chorus from "Judas Maccabean" by Misses Rogers and Horne and Zion's Musical Society was partly ruined by the bad manners of a portion of the audience who began to leave the hall about the time the piece commenced. As an entirety, we repeat, the entertainment fully deserved the generous patronage bestowed upon it, and was decidedly an artistic success. True, there were defects, but such things are common to all entertainments. The concert was one to be agreeably remembered by all who were present.

**Yesterday's Shooting Accident.**—Yesterday afternoon as we were going to press, a shocking event happened on Commercial Street, in the shooting of a little child by a year or two older. Our hurried account was mainly correct. The child shot was a boy aged about three years and at the time of the fatal occurrence was in a room in Mr. Parsons' residence, with its mother, Mrs. Williams, who was there visiting Mrs. Parsons. The child was standing near the door, when the five-year-old son of Mr. Parsons presented the pistol to his breast and fired, the ball entering near the heart and killing the little one instantly. At the inquest held last evening, it was decided that the pistol, a small breech-loader, belonged to an older son of Mr. Parsons, who, it is supposed, left it carelessly within reach of his little brother, and that the latter was entirely irresponsible for the fatal event. He is too young to realize the nature of the terrible deed he has committed, and innocently remarked that he once had a little pistol of his own (a toy) and had snapped it at himself without its hurting him. Mrs. Williams is nearly heart-broken, and it was feared last night that she would go wild with grief. To-day it was even reported that she had taken to her bed, but the rumor proved untrue. Her distress is partly shared by Mr. and Mrs. Parsons, the father and mother of the unconscious homicide. Mrs. Williams, who is at work in the mines, was immediately telegraphed for, and informed of the sad event which has robbed him of the last of his children. He arrived home this morning, and found his wife at the residence of Mr. Hughes, 15th Ward, where she is at present staying.
