The following telegram has been | Court. received by the President, from Governor Moses of South Caro lina:

"Columbia, S. C., "Bept. 25, 1874.

"To Hi, Excellency U. S. Grant, President of the United States, Washington, D. C:

The state of affairs in Edgefie'd county in this State has been for the last ten days of such a character as to threaten the lives and the detruction of property of law-abiding and peaceful citizens. I have ex. Bridy Mrs hausted my efforts, with the peaceful and legal means at my command, to restore the usual situation. Armed bands are assembled at vari ous points in the county and have demanded the surrender to them of the State arms in the hands of the regularly organized militia of the State. From this action a reign of terror exists. I issued my Dudley H proclamation on the 22nd instant. commanding those armed bands to disperse and retire to their homes within three days, and hereafter to refrain from a repetition of such action. They are still under arms, and I am powerless to enforce myorders except by the use of inexperien- Fisher M ced State militia, the employment of Freke Mrs which I fear would hasten a conflict, which I desire to avoid. Having exhausted all the means at my Grani M L command I call upon you, under the constitution of the U.S., for such assistance as will enable me to restore the peace and quiet of the county, and to this end I ask that you will send immediately an order to Col. H. M. Black, commanding the U.S. forces here, to report to me with such of his command as it may be found necessary to employ. Please answer as speedy as possible. (Signed)
